STATE ISSUES DISCUSSED BY THE GOVERNOR

highways, towns and city maintenance and the numerous other things which the people have by their direct vote, voted in the past few years.

"I do not stand before you, trying to sidestep any responsibility, nor do I wish you to understand that I am making any apology for the conduct of the state's business. Not at all. I am here merely to meet you face to face and tell you the truth about conditions in Oregon."

Eulogized Kiddle.

The governor reviewed the highway work and told of his satisfaction over the appointment of the late Edward E. Kiddle whom he said did wonderful work in the honorary office which he held. "The state of Oregon suffered a keen loss in the death of Mr. Kiddle just as Union county suffered a loss," said the governor.

In speaking of his opponent, Walter M. Pierce, of La Grande, Governor Olcott assured the people that he had always held a high regard for Mr. Pierce. "I appointed him as a member of the board of re-

gents of O. A. C., a position which I deem very important, and I also appointed your fellowtownsman on the tax investigating commission, another important position," he said.

Kay Strikes Hard.

When Thomas B. Kay was introduced he did not use the art of diplomacy as gracefully as did the governor, for Mr. Kay went right after the democratic state committee and also after Mr. Pierce. He contended that the campaign had been one of fabrication, of innuendo and that it lacked sincerity on the part of the opposition to Olcott.

The speaker then went into his figures and spent some time segregating the taxes raised by the legislature and those voted on the people by themselves. Producing a chart he showed the tax dollar dissected into different divisions showing what channels it went into, and made a forceful argument on the amount which the state has to use for state purposes only.

"Economy, of course, we must have economy," shouted Mr. Kay, "but it is not becoming for any of us to point our fingers at our neighbors since we have all been guilty of voting bond issues for everything that came up. I do challenge the opposition to show where the state administration has been anything but economical, and I stand with the people ready, willing and anxious to put on the brakes in the future on further taxes whether voted by the people, direct or by the legislature. We have reached a

time in Oregon when we must take put before the people. Mrs. Kay was a member of the governor's party as was also J. L. Pettit, representing the Portland

The speaker took up several state-ments made by Mr. Pierce in his Oregonian, and David Hazen, representing the Portland Telegram, ing evidence to show that in many instances the facts had not been stated.
