Monks Grateful to American Nurses

ERIVAN, Armenia, Sept. 26. The breaking of the thousand-year rule of the monastery was in recognition of the work which the three nurses have done for refugee orphan children located in the district.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Vice President Calvin Coolidge, who was in New York Thursday, predicted a republican victory in New Jersey in November. He spoke Thursday night in Newark, in the interest of Senator Joseph S. Pritchard's candidacy for re-election. The vice
