**INDIANS TAKE PART IN FILM**

**SALT LAKE, Oct. 19, (Special).**—Two trainloads of Indians, drawn from the Fort Hall reservation in Idaho and from the Arapahoe tribe in Wyoming, reached Salt Lake Wednesday, en route to Baker, Neb., where they are to be employed in scenes taken by a motion picture company.


