the sale of government timber. If this timber is sold their taxes will be higher.

The disease has prevented the growing of white pine in northern Europe. It has established its hold in New England, New York and the lake states. It has reached British Columbia and Washington. Can we save Oregon? Only by prompt vigorous action.

The disease begins on the leaves of wild or cultivated current or gooseberry bushes. In late fall, the brown leaf surfaces, from which it spreads by spores to the pine. It is not visible on the pines for several years after this, but it eventually kills the tree by working on the bark and stranding it.

All current and gooseberry bushes spread the disease, but the black current is most dangerous. These should be destroyed. The pines concerned are those that have five needles in a group.

Help stamp out the disease by reporting the location of all current bushes, gooseberry bushes and planted pines. Send any diseased parts to the agricultural experiment station.

All children of the schools are looking for the disease. You may report to them.
