## BOXERS WILL HOLD TOURNEY

(By Associated Press)  
PORTLAND, Oct. 21. — Feather weight boxers of the Pacific Coast have been invited to participate in a big championship tournament which will be held here tomorrow night. The tournament will be held under the auspices of the Portland boxing commission.

The winner of the tourney will be given a belt and a certificate, showing him to be the coast champion, with the understanding that he is to defend his title at least once every three months in the Pacific zone.

In the elimination contests the boxers will be matched in two ten-round bouts on each fight card. The first show, with two of the ten-round contests will be held tomorrow night. Boxers may weigh as much as 125 pounds in the elimination trials but in the final bouts they must weigh not more than 125 pounds at 2 o'clock on the day of the contest.

Featherweights from all sections of the coast are expected to attend. A few days after the announcement of the tournament, the commission was flooded with telegrams from managers of the little boxers asking for bouts. Joe Gorman, Portland, a leading contender, was the first to step forward and it is probable that he will appear in the first show.
