

# FARMERS NEED LOWER RATES

### Secretary Wallace Says Transportation Is an Important Item in Business.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 25.—Lower freight rates and unhampered transportation are demanded by the farmers, Henry C. Wallace, secretary of agriculture, declared in an address here Monday night.

Freight rates on agricultural products should be decreased, Secretary Wallace said, because they are too high with relation to the prices farmers get.

"Transportation is a part of production so far as agriculture is concerned," the secretary said. "The farmer pays the freight. He does not want railroads to reduce freight rates so low that they cannot furnish efficient service. Service is important to the farmer. But the freight rates are now too high. The farmers want the railroad people to cut down their operating costs, to insist upon a fair day's work for a fair day's wage, to move their freight cheaper and thus be able to cut down rates."

Declaring that many growers of perishable products have gone bankrupt because they could not move their crops, and that grain growers and livestock producers have lost "millions upon millions of dollars" in the last six months because railroad owners and railroad workmen could not agree, the secretary said:

"Some way must be found to break monopolies of both capital and labor and keep them at work. These quarrels between railroads and the workmen, which hang up freight movement, must be stopped in some way or other."

# DISTRIBUTION ON A NEW BASE

BOISE, Oct. 25.—Cars distributed by the Pacific Fruit Express will be divided equally between the O. S. L. and O. W. R. & N., according to a telegram received at the public utilities commission from J. C. Troth, director of service for the interstate commerce commission. This telegram, which contained a statement from President Sequist of the Pacific Fruit Express company was an answer to the telegram sent by the commission October 20, protesting against the method of distribution of cars to the Glenns Ferry-Huntington district.

Under the old system of distribution, no matter how many cars were received, 42 must go to the O. W. R. & N., while this district would receive only the small end. Under the new ruling, if 50 cars are distributed to the O. W. R. & N. and the O. S. L., they will be distributed equally between the O. S. L. and the O. W. R. & N.

# MARINES HAVE A SWELL TIME

RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 25.—The ubiquitous U. S. Marine has become a familiar sight on the streets of this city, where a detachment of American Marines is making an extended visit during the period of the Centennial celebration. A part of their traditional blue uniform is worn by the sea soldiers, but they have substituted white duck for the more conventional blue trousers in deference to the tropical climate and now appear in public in a snappy white-blue-white combination.

Their camp is on a broad plaza close to the waterfront, commanding a view of the spacious harbor, the wooded hills dotted here and there with some of Rio's most pretentious buildings forming a picturesque background. Their tents are pitched in orderly rows and they have messhalls, a hospital and every department of a complete camp.

Led by the Sixth Regiment band the soldiers of the sea have taken part in many parades and national or international ceremonies, among

them the laying of a corner-stone for a monument presented by the Portuguese government to the Brazilians which is to be erected on the camp site occupied by the Marines. They have visited all the local places of interest and have made numerous sightseeing trips to Sugarloaf Mountain and other nearby points.

Under the command of Major Randolph Coyle the Marines, representing nearly every state of the Union, have made themselves thoroughly at home in Rio, and have done much to advance the entente cordiale between the American and Brazilian governments.
