DOPE FAVORS L. H. S. TEAM

With Football Season Half Over, La Grande Shows Up as Best Machine So Far.

With the first half of the race for football honors in Eastern Oregon complete, three candidates for the championship stands out—La Grande, Wallawa and Hermiston. La Grande or Wallawa, should they come out ahead, could still be tied by Hermiston who has a game with neither team. In fact Hermiston has only one more game scheduled and that on November 11 with Athena. If such a tie should ensue between La Grande and Hermiston, the former would have the clearest claim to the pennant as La Grande's schedule embraces all of Eastern Oregon while Hermiston confines herself to Umatilla county.

So far, La Grande has presented the finest football machine. With a fast heavy line and a clockwork backfield, La Grande has delighted her followers with some classy grid work. Pendleton, last year's champions, are the disappointment of the season. Going into a slump at the first of the season they lost two games to small schools and finally broke into the win column by swamping Amiteño's proteges at Enterprise outclassing them in every way.

Wallawa Darkhorse.

Wallawa still remains a darkhorse despite her defeat of Union. According to dope La Grande should be at least four touchdowns better than Union and therefore Wallawa looms as a possible block in the path of the local team. McGinnis, her star player, is the central portion of the team and is classed as one of the best backs in Eastern Oregon on his showing last Saturday.

Baker, with poor material, failed to show anything although she is steadily improving. Her team is too light to be a favorite against any of the leading teams.

Union, Joseph, Enterprise and Imbler are not classed as extra strong teams and only Union and Enterprise are likely to win many games. Union, with a husky lineup, should
