TELEPHONE RATE IS AGAIN FOUGHT

State Public Service Commission Order of Yesterday Cuts Big Sum from Company.

PORTLAND, Oct. 31.—A petition for an injunction restraining the state public service commission from putting into effect an order for reduced telephone rates was issued late yesterday and filed in the Federal district court today by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

The petition states that the order, which was made to go into effect on December 1, affects 49,000 subscribers throughout the state, and would cut \$200,000 annually from the company's revenue, preventing it from earning more than one and five tenths per cent on the investment in the state. The reduction ordered by the commission averaged seven to twenty five per cent, affecting principally ten party and four party residential and business telephones.

Albany, Astoria, Corvallis, Medford, Klamath Falls, Roseburg and Grants Pass, including group two under the commission's classification, in which business service rates, ranging on suburban ten party lines, was reduced from \$2.50 to \$2.25, and residence four party code ranging from \$2.25 to \$1.75, and suburban ten party lines for residence from \$2.50 to \$2.00 monthly.

FORGET-ME-NOT DAY OBSERVANCE

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 31.—Fraternal societies and patriotic organizations including the Boy Scouts of America, are taking an active part in the observance of the national "Forget-Me-Not Day" to be observed November 4, according to G. Hamilton Cook, National Commander of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War.

Proceeds derived from the sale of the flowers will be used in the interests of the wounded and disabled American veterans of the recent war, in welfare and relief, national legislative assistance, rehabilitation and hospitalization aids and numerous other benefits, said Commander Cook.

The services of the Boy Scouts were offered by James E. West, of New York, chief scout executive. The scouts will act as liaison officers between the various committees, and will patrol the headquarters of the citizens' committees and other officials associated with the activities of the day.

Among the other accomplishments reviewed by Mr. Hughes as a part of the constructive program of the administration, were the negotiation of a peace treaty with Germany, the Van Antwerp pact, the American interests in the mandate islands of the Pacific, the reorganization of Cuba's finances, the Taena Arica arbitration agreement between Chile and Peru, the calling of a conference here of Central American republics, and the stabilization of Haiti and Santo Domingo.

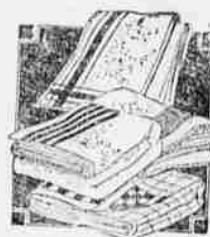

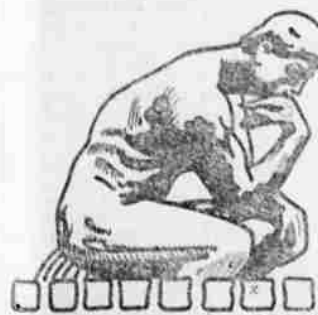
