NORWAY ADOPTS STRICT MEASURE

Sets Ten Mile Marine Limit Against Rum-Runners; Prohibition Hard to Enforce.

CHRISTIANIA, Oct. 23. (By Mail)—Liquor smuggling into Norway, in violation of the prohibition laws, has increased "terribly" at such a rapid rate that government officials are finding the work of suppression most difficult.

Smuggling on a large scale is going on all along the coast, the thousands of islands and fjords furnishing ideal hiding places and operating bases for the illegal traffic. The efforts of the smugglers seem to be concentrated about the inlet of the Christiania-fjord, and here is established a real market place at the outskirts of the three-mile limit, swarming with German and Danish liquor smuggling vessels.

A Norwegian law now allows revenue officials to search and bring in suspicious vessels as far out as ten miles from the coast. This extension of the control district, however, has served only to increase the difficult work of the officials.

So far other nations have not officially accepted the extension of Norway's water control to the ten mile limit, and opponents of the law point out that international complications could easily arise should a foreign boat be seized and forcibly brought into a Norwegian port.

Hundreds of thousands of gallons of alcohol and whiskey find their way into the country, and only a very small percentage is being taxed. The smugglers have a thoroughly organized business, but high powered motor boats to bring the goods from the storage depots anchored outside Norwegian waters. Submarine divers obtained from the German navy are ideal for the work of the smugglers. These divers are equipped with radio and smoke screen apparatus. They are in constant wireless communication with the shore, and are thus able to choose the right moment for a dash to the beach.

The most serious handicap the government has to contend with is the coast population itself, which co-operates in more than one way with the rum-runners.

A patrol steamer equipped with two guns has been put into operation by the revenue officers, but the speedy boats of the smugglers are out of reach before damage can be done to them.

LIQUOR FOR MINCE PIES

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—In a new attack on the Volstead act by the old Victory distillery, Judge George T. Page, in federal district court, has been asked to restore mince pies to their pre-prohibition standing, when brandy sauce was a legitimate ingredient. Attorneys for the distillery contended the Volstead act is unconstitutional if it prohibits the sale of spirituous liquors for cooking purposes. They suggested that liquors have great value as an aid to the culinary arts, and by some cooks are deemed essential, especially in the preparation of mince pies.

SALEM GROWS OWN WALNUTS

SALEM, Nov. 4.—Sufficient walnuts to supply every man, woman and child in Salem with two and a half pounds have been grown in the parking spaces and yards within the city limits, a variety of Salem variety.

Approximately 15,000 pounds of nuts were grown on the city's shade trees this year. It is estimated that this is more than enough to supply the entire needs of the city for the entire year. The crop is valued at \$12,000.

Local authorities believe that there are enough trees growing in Salem parking spaces to plant an orchard of 60 acres. There are believed to be over 1,000 trees within the city limits.

In order to determine which varieties of walnuts will do the best locally, many of the growers have been doing considerable experimental work. One grower has a dozen different varieties growing on one tree.

BLACKSMITH POET HONORED

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 6.—The seal of Buckingham palace, residence of King George V of England bears a letter received by James J. Corbett of this city. The letter was sent to Corbett in answer to some verses the latter sent the British monarch in honor of America's "unknown soldier."

Corbett, who is a blacksmith, spends much of his time working in lumber camps. He spends his evenings while in the woods in writing verses.

The letter which Corbett received from King George's private secretary in acknowledging the verses the blacksmith-poet wrote in honor of the "unknown soldier" follows: "The private secretary is commended to thank Mr. James J. Corbett for the copy of his verses which he has been good enough to send for the king's acceptance, but regrets to inform Mr. Corbett that it is contrary to rule for his majesty to express an opinion on contributions of this nature."

Corbett also sent a copy of his poem to President Harding and received an answer from George Christian, the president's private secretary, similar to the one received from the secretary of the English king.
