

LA GRANDE HAS CAMPFIRE GIRLS

Organization, Lead by Mrs. A. E. Pryke, is Making a Success. Details Given.

The program of the Campfire girls is the result of the effort on the part of the founders of the organization to find adventure, beauty and romance in the everyday life of a girl, and to make the everyday tasks at home contribute to the beauty of that everyday life.

Girls of the Campfire learn to share and to work together, and mothers and their daughters are brought into a closer relationship, and to a better understanding of each other. Through the sharing of interests, as well as the task, girls learn the spirit of team work and communion together.

To some girls the Campfire program offers untold opportunities for community service, to others it means a greater participation in outdoor life, to others it means a channel for social activities, and yet whatever the appeal to the individual girl, all find through the Campfire Program the romance in the life in the home. The highest development of the intellect, proportionately balanced by the development of the body, produces greater opportunity to give service—the highest ideals of the Campfire being kept alive by active service in definite lines. Health to a Campfire girl is a sacred thing, and by wholesome habits in their everyday life they develop greater bodily strength and vigor.

Campfire girls appreciate the highest values in life, and endeavor to live so that their daily lives are a direct application of those ideals. Their aim is to make their lives just as splendid and wholesome and serviceable as possible. The Campfire program is a great uplift agency in the life of every girl in the community in which the program is instituted. No girl being brought under the influence of the Campfire, but is made more appreciative of her home—the place where every girl should be. And being brought into closer contact with the home and the church, is therefore of greater service and value to the community in general.

The basis of course is the home. The work of the home, be it only the washing of dishes, or making of beds, etc., is dignified and made interesting by being made worthy of praise when it is well done. The awarding of honor beads for doing these tasks will stimulate new interest in what would otherwise be considered mundane tasks. There is a list of almost eight hundred honors in the Campfire program which pertain to work in and about the home. This program is applicable to every girl in the community between the ages of 12 and 18, and aims to train girls to realize their responsibility to their home, to their community and to their country. It is suggested and adaptable to the needs of all girls of all classes.

The honor lists in the Campfire girls' program are divided into seven crafts: homecraft, health craft, camp craft, hand craft, nature craft, business craft and citizenship or patriotism. They represent broadly the significance in every girl's life.

This organization is formed on a natural group basis and consists of not less than six and not more than twenty girls in the Campfire. Every Campfire has its guardian—whom the girls use as their pattern. This organization is being sponsored in La Grande by the Neighborhood club, by which the following committee has been appointed as the local council of the Campfire: Mrs. Fred Schilke, chair-

man, Miss Margaret Anson and Mrs. Floyd McKennon.
