HUMAN HEARTS' NOW SHOWING AT ARCADE

"Ask Dad—he knows!" There is the flavor of other generations in "Human Hearts," the Universal-Jewel attraction now showing at the Arcade Theatre for three days, of which so much has been said.

"Human Hearts" is ever timely, yet to parents and grandparents of today it has more meaning than to the younger generation. The younger ones don't know what an influence the old play of "Human Hearts" was in America years ago. It was the success of the decade. It had more road companies playing at once than any other dramatic piece.

Like all the plays of "those days" it is essentially simple, powerful in theme and direct in exposition. The picture has been filmed just as the play was staged.

The memories it arouses are poignant. It recalls the life of plain days, when people were merely "folks" and the pleasure of the day was wholesome and unpretentious. Old homes, old fields, old roads, the crops ripening in late summer suns, the liveliness of girls in white summer dresses, husking, beans, etc.

House Peters, one of the most popular and virile stars on either screen or stage, today, plays the stellar role of Tom Logan. He brings to the part a sympathetic understanding and finish that makes it stand out as one of the best things he ever did. The clever and beautiful Edith Hallor is Peters' leading woman, and the supporting cast includes many cinema notables, among whom are Russell Simpson, Gertrude Claire, George Hackathorn, George W. West, Lucretia Harris, Ramsay Wallace, Mary Phillips, H. S. Karr and Snitz Edwards.

King Baggott, who was chosen to direct the old stage success, was an ideal choice in view of his having played Peters' part in stock and road show companies for several years.

AT SHERRY'S LAST DAY. Great Dramatic Power in "The Hands of Sara."

Richard Washburn Child, the present Ambassador to Italy, is the author of the novel, "The Hands of Sara," on which is based the screen play by the same name which opened yesterday at the Sherry Theatre with Clara Kimball Young as the star. Mr. Child's story makes a photoplay that is satisfactory throughout, and it is certain to be one of the most successful of the year's photoplays.

"The Hands of Sara" is composed of a series of very effective situations, each one of them tense and gripping with plenty of dramatic action and suspense. The story has its setting first in Russia during the revolution, and then moves to New York's lower East Side. Here, and on Fifth Avenue, many of the most important scenes take place.

Miss Young plays the role of Sara, a beautiful girl whose exquisite hands are believed to convey a remarkable healing power. She succeeds in locating the sick, but she falls in love with a strong-willed scientist, a young doctor, who does not believe in spiritualism or in anything but science. The clash of these two personalities is one of the many interesting episodes in the play.

A supporting cast of prominence is seen in the film. Elliott Dexter is prominently in the cast opposite Miss Young in the role of the young scientist. Also showing "Nobody's Baby," a comedy.

INDIAN STUDENT. EUGENE, Nov. 2.—Eleanor Houk, of the Blackfoot tribe, is the first Indian girl to attend the University of Oregon. Her home is in Browning, Mont., a small town situated a few miles from Glacier national park. She received her grammar school education and a part of her high school education at Carlisle, Pa., the largest Indian school in the United States, which was abolished during the war by the government.

Coming to Oregon in 1918, she entered Salem high school, and graduated in 1920 with high honors. The following year she taught in the lower grades at Chemawa. This fall she enrolled at the University as a freshman, with the intention of completing four full years in the department of physical education.
