Hula Hula Dance Is A Libel on Hawaiian Life

(By Associated Press.)
HONOLULU, Nov. 4. (AP)—The Hula, two ancient and forgotten dances on the statute books of Hawaii, which still are effective could be invoked to suppress the hula-hula dance of Hawaii, which is usually performed by a group of women, according to an announcement by territorial attorney-general John A. Mathewman, in connection with recent efforts to

abolish the hula exhibitions, now given mainly for the entertainment of tourists.

The announcement followed the adoption of a resolution by the Hawaiian Civic Club, composed of leading Hawaiians, denouncing the Hula, as a "libel upon the Hawaiian race and its customs."

Judge Mathewman said that the two hulas which might be enforced against exhibitions had been on the statutes of the territory for many years—one since 1859 and the second since 1875, this having been adopted when Hawaii was a republic.

In connection with the campaign against the hula, Vaughan MacGaughey, territorial superintendent of schools, while addressing the Honolulu Athletic Club, declared that the "so-called high society dancing, which is seen at leading social events, is more immoral than the hula."

1923 LICENSES WILL BE BLUE

Secretary of State Gives Details Concerning 1923 Motor Vehicle License.

Application blanks for 1923 licenses have been mailed by the Secretary of State to all motor vehicle owners in Oregon, so as to permit them to apply for and receive such licenses before January 1, 1923. Motor vehicle owners will avoid much trouble, annoyance and unnecessary delay by promptly applying for their 1923 licenses upon receipt of the application blanks. Deferring applying for licenses until the first of the year only congests the work of the Secretary of State's office and may result in the arrest of the car owners by traffic officers for failure to have the 1923 license on their cars after January 1st next. License plates for 1923 will have a dark blue background and white figures and letters.

Up to October 22, 1922, there have been registered and licensed in Oregon 556 motor vehicle dealers, 11,804 chauffeurs, 211,096 motor vehicle operators, 3,126 motorcycles and 131,934 passenger and commercial cars, from which the total license fees aggregate \$1,307,571.98. The fees, less administrative expenses, are distributed

one-fourth to the counties from which the registrations are received and three-fourths to the state highway fund for use in road construction and improvement throughout the state generally.

The distribution of the registrations up to September 15, 1922, shows that in Union county there were registered nine motor vehicle dealers, 65 chauffeurs, 254 motor vehicle operators, 89 motorcycles and 2,265 passenger cars, five ambulances and hearses, six houses and trailers, 38 commercial cars of less than one ton capacity, 127 trucks of from one to five tons capacity and 12 trailers of from one to five tons capacity, or a total of 2,483 licensed passengers and commercial motor vehicles.

ARMY STRIKES ROUGH PLACE

Although the Salvation Army drive started out well and about a thousand dollars has been raised, according to the manager of the drive this morning, the Army has struck a rough place in the track and business not so good.

The Salvation people had hoped to raise about \$2,000 in Union county for the year's work which would enable them to resume the tambourine collection taking, and they still have such hopes.

"It is going to require a stronger effort on our part," said one of the workers today, "but the army is not to be deterred and we think we will get the amount we originally planned to get before the campaign is over."

Wallowa School House Is Nearing Completion

Wallowa's new high school is rapidly nearing completion, and promises to be ready for occupancy in a week or so. Two men have been engaged in cleaning the exterior. The painters have about finished the upper floor, and it now presents a fine appearance. The painting of the lower floor is now going on and should be finished this week. The carpenter work is also nearly finished. A. C. Reed arrived Tuesday to install the ventilating system, which took about three days to complete. The folding doors have been installed, allowing the assembly room to be enlarged when necessary.

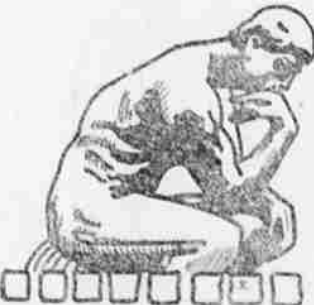
FLOUR UP FORTY CENTS ON BARREL
