

KAISER WEDS HERMIONE IN DOORN CASTLE

Germany's Deposed Ruler
Starts Life Anew With
Buxom Princess of Reuss.

DOORN, Holland, Nov. 7. The former German emperor, once at the height of the empire, and Princess Hermoine of Reuss were married Sunday at the house of Doorn where the lord abides in exile. This second venture was in strange contrast with that day in 1881 when, as crown prince, he wedded Augusta Victoria, daughter of Grand Duke Frederick of Schleswig-Holstein.

Several of the offspring of that first union were present Sunday to get the seal of family approval to the new alliance.

There were two ceremonies, a civil contract drawn up and signed by "Wilhelm II." and "Hermoine Reuss" as they affixed their names; the second, a religious ceremony conducted by the Summer Court Chaplain Doctor Vogel, according to the Lutheran rights.

Secrecy Maintained.

The air of secrecy surrounding the entire affair has been well maintained throughout. The climax of the systematic organization adopted by the household came when the bride's sister, Princess Ida, who resembles her, successfully passed herself off as the bride at the Amsterdam station Saturday evening with an array of male ears, whereas Princess Hermoine left the train at Apeldoorn, half an hour early and drove to the castle unobserved, those within the palace making much of this as a huge joke.

At the religious ceremony which began with the singing of the Lutheran hymn "Jesus Geh Voran," Pastor Vogel preached from the text, "Now abideth faith, hope and charity."

The bridal couple occupied carved gilt arm chairs surmounted by crowns, while the numerous guests were seated in rows behind them.

Minister Speaks.

"Now the joyful day has arrived," declared the minister, "when his majesty and her serene highness join hands." He recalled that the same text had served at the golden wedding of William I and at the bridegroom's own silver wedding.

"The bride," said he, "has left fatherland and friends to unite her life with that of his majesty whose faith is unshaken." "him in circumstances which would have driven others to despair."

As an evidence of faith he pointed out that the "kaiser" conducted religious services on every Lord's day in his home; the speaker paid tribute to the virtues of the late Emperor and Princess Hermoine's former husband, referring to the "kaiserin" as the ideal of German womanhood. "Love each other as God loves you," he admonished, "and you shall prevail over all evil reports."

BIG GAME ON HOME-COMING

MISSOULA, Mont., Nov. 7. — The University of Montana-Montana State College football game, a joint meeting of the alumni of the University and the State College and the dedication of the new gymnasium, are among the events that will feature annual Homecoming week at the University of Montana this year. The week's celebration will close Saturday, November 11, with the University-Agile football game.

The committee in charge of this year's festivities anticipate an unusually large crowd of visitors, and are making their plans accordingly. A special train will bring the State College students to Missoula on Armistice Day, when teams representing the two state institutions will clash on the football field.

All of the University's new build-

ings will be open for inspection during Homecoming, although none of them will be completed before December 1. The formal dedication of the new gymnasium will also take place. A dedication dance will be held in the evening.

It is probable that a sophomore-freshman field day will be held in the morning of the day of the football game, to determine the supremacy of the two classes. An old-fashioned dinner for the alumni and former students of both colleges will be held in the evening after the game.

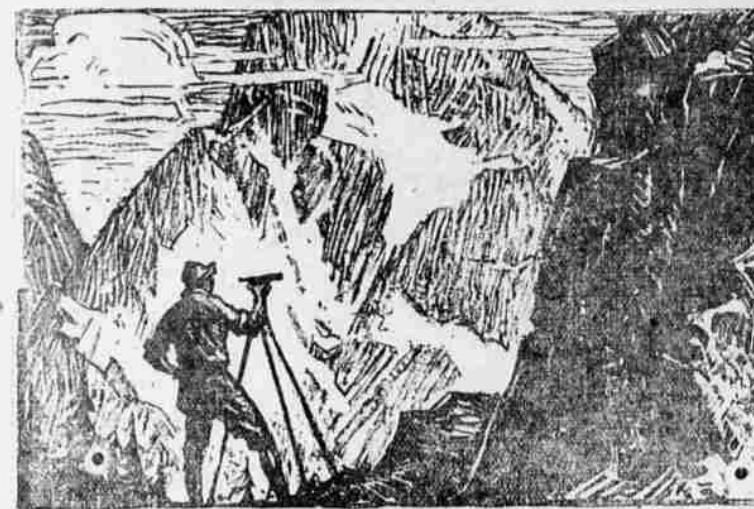
