"HUMAN HEARTS" BETTER AS FILM THAN ON STAGE

The mere fact that a stage play scores a great success is no certain indication that a screen presentation can duplicate the feat, in fact the odds are against it, therefore, when the film version exceeds the excellence of the original, it is a real triumph for the producer. Universal can well be proud of "Human Hearts," the picture version of Hal Reid's eminent stage success, when swept the country a decade or so ago. It opened an engagement of three days at the Arcade theater last night and won the unanimous commendation of the large audience.

House Peters, one of the finest emotional actors in pictures today brings to the role of Tom Logan a sympathetic understanding and dramatic ability of such a high order that the characterization can well be termed a masterpiece of emotional acting. Throughout the production is perfectly cast. In fact, it is one of the few pictures that really deserves the distinction of being called "all-star."

Edith Hallor's work as the city siren marks her as an actress whose work will be worth watching. She portrays womanly softness and coyness, as well as hard heartedness and bitterness, in a finished style one sees all too seldom.

Others deserving special mention in the large cast are Russell Simpson as "Pa" Logan, Gertrude Claire as "Ma," George Hackathorne as Jimmy Logan, Mary Phillip as Ruth, Snitz Edwards in this comedy relief part of the village cut-up. The picture was directed by King Baggot and it is of interest to note that it was this same King Baggot that played the role of Tom Logan in a sketchy photoplay of "Human Hearts" filmed many years back. The original and 1922 productions differ as much as day and night, but Baggot's experience in the part fitted him to direct the picture far better than anyone else.

"Human Hearts" proves beyond question that it is possible to make pictures that one can see without being offended by stretched moral viewpoints. It leaves you with a clean taste in your mouth and a new respect for the cinema art.

AT SHERRY'S GIBSON IS A REAL "THE MAN" STAR

Busting bucking bronchos has been Hoot Gibson's long suit ever since he was ankle high to a grasshopper. He is the champion horseman of the screen and there is no one to say him nay. In "The Galloping Kid," his latest Universal starring vehicle, directed by Nat Ross, Gibson's equestrian ability cannot be disproved by even an audience of the ex-kaiser's ex-Uhlans.

"The Galloping Kid" is an entirely different brand of western. The central figure in the story is a tramp cowboy who unexpectedly falls heir to a job as chaperon to a girl who is far too pretty to live in the caustic country. So the chaperon marries her to save her from the rest of the desert galoots.

The leading feminine role is played by Edna Murphy who makes a very delightful opposite for Hoot Gibson. Others in the supporting cast are Lionel Belmore, Leon Barry, Jack Walters, Percy Challenger and Steve Clemente.

A novel feature in "The Galloping Kid" is the fact that it was for this picture that the famous Montezuma castle in Arizona was photographed for the first time by a motion picture camera.

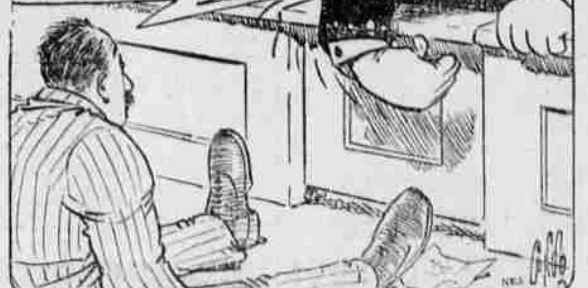

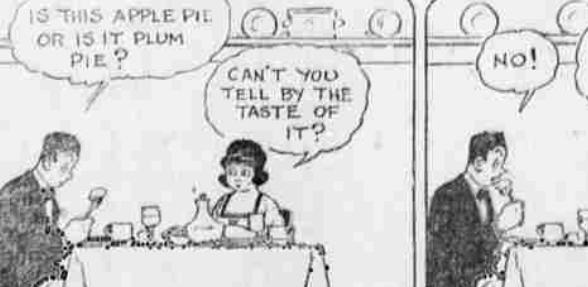
