ODD FELLOWS
ENJOY A BIG
CELEBRATION

UNION, Nov. 9. (Special).—Union was the Mecca for Odd Fellows from this end of the valley and from Baker last Friday evening, when the degree team of Baker Lodge Number 25 came down to put on the third degree for a candidate in the local lodge. For the floor work the new K. of P. hall was rented and lodge was held there for the one evening. Members of the Rebekah degree and the wives of Odd Fellows had charge of the Odd Fellows' hall where they prepared a beautiful banquet while the boys were showing George Lawrence the mysteries of the last degree in the subordinate lodge. After lodge closed the members, numbering about eighty, repaired to the other hall where they enjoyed supper and listened to speeches, songs and other varieties of entertainment. Tables were spread for about seventy-five and they were filled the second time, as there were over a hundred and fifty present.

The football first team looked horns with the Halfway boys on the local grounds last Saturday afternoon. In a game which at first looked rather serious for the Union eleven. Halfway started with lots of pep and in a few minutes had secured a touchdown. They seemed able to go through the Union line at will. Final score was, Union 14, Halfway 6.

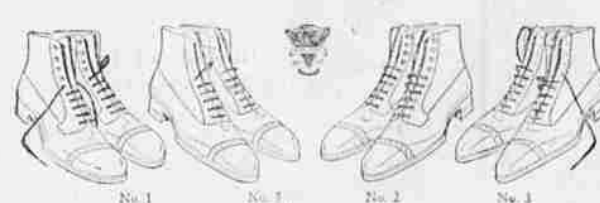
