## CENTURY OLD INDIAN DIES

ABERDEEN, Wash., Nov. 1.—John Kukatap, probably the last of the real Quinalt Indians, who for years was a government judge among his tribesmen, died recently on the tribe's reservation near here. Kukatap followers said he was more than 100 years old, although government records gave his age at 87. The tribal burial accorded the aged leader was simple and according to Quinalt customs. The day after the body was discovered in the cabin where the judge had lived for years, it was prepared for interment. While the members of the tribe looked on, the body was carried in a canoe across the Quinalt river, famous as an Indian fishing ground, and deposited in the ancient cemetery beside the grave of Chief Tabulah, famous as a warrior in the annals of the Quinalt tribe. No service of any kind marked the deposit of the body in its shallow grave. A huge pile of rocks was the only monument erected by the Indians to mark the spot where their leader rested.
