LOCAL CLUB IS NOT IN ACCORD WITH NEW LAWS

Wing, Fin and Fleetfoot Club Believes that State Game Commission Has Been Unwise.

The following article, compiled by a member of the Wing, Fin and Fleetfoot Club of La Grande, was presented to the Observer by A. V. Andrews, secretary, and represents the feeling of the members of the club in regards to the wisdom of the State Game Commission's action in making several changes in the game laws.

First, I doubt the wisdom of the State Game Commission in making the changes in the game laws in 1922. While this committee is created them under Section 8, Chapter 60, General Laws of Oregon, 1921, such changes should only be made after close consultation of the sportsmen of the district affected. In this particular instance, I do not believe this was done. All true sportsmen have the interests of game protection and game propagation as much at heart as the State Game Commission or the other officers authorized to enforce the game laws, and I believe they are in a better position to recommend changes in the game laws for their particular district.

Second, any endeavor to make the game laws uniform all over the state of Oregon or any particular group of states, is a mistake. The variation of the climatic conditions, the different species of game and the very different topography of the country, makes this impracticable.

For instance, the climatic conditions of Eastern and Western Oregon are as varied as Oregon and Idaho. A season that would be applicable to Western Oregon would not suit Eastern Oregon at all, and vice versa. The quantity of game in a particular part of the state might justify a long open season, while another part of the state the season should be much shorter. While there are arguments in favor of the present seasons, the most are against it.

Third, any proposed changes in the game laws should directly be referred to the different sporting organizations in the district affected. For instance, any changes to be made in the game laws affecting Union county, I am sure, could be referred to the Wing, Fin and Fleetfoot Club for their recommendation, at least. With a membership of over two hundred, and I am sure we have the most representative sportsmen in the county, I can safely say that only honest consideration would be given to all changes and with the best interests of the sportsmen and the interests of the State Game Commission, I am convinced the members of the State Game Commission are honest in their findings but they cannot be familiar with the needs in game protection in every locality in the state.

The Deer Law.
I am sure that I can safely say that a large majority of the sportsmen in this district think that the commission made a mistake in changing the deer law. The season opens entirely too early. Many hunters can be cited where hunters had their deer spoil on account of the hot weather. Every effort must be made in August and September to keep meat and sell before it spoils. While deer are killed in this district early in the season I am sure that the sportsmen would rather have a much shorter season and have it extend later in the year when conditions are more favorable for hunting and when they will be able to keep their meat without any difficulty. Therefore, I would recommend that the deer season in this district be from October 1 to November 15th. I would add to this recommendation that they be allowed one buck and one doe in lieu of the two bucks allowed under the present laws. The reason for this is obvious. Any hunter in this district who has given this much thought while hunting in the woods cannot help note the large number of barren does and the scarcity of bucks. Our party this fall hunted three large barren does all alone. These undoubtedly had not mated even this year. This same tendency, I am sure, can be noted in almost every party in the woods this fall. Most of the bunches of does and fawns found by the hunters this fall were without bucks and fawns.

bucks could be found in their neighborhood as late as October 25th, in a country where deer are very numerous. I firmly believe that almost every hunter has lost excellent shots at a buck, waiting to see the horns when he was positive that his object was a deer. Our woods are entirely different from the coast woods, and the danger of shooting a hunter for a deer would be very rare. In twenty-five years I cannot recall but one instance where a hunter was shot for a deer.

The Grouse Law.
Our season is entirely too long at present and I would recommend that it be changed to the first week in October, or from the first Sunday to the second Sunday in October. Should the law remain as it is, we will have few birds left in a few years. From the number of birds killed this year in Union county, their scarcity is going to be very noticeable next year. I am sure the great majority of sportsmen in Union county will agree with me in this view.

The change the game commission made in the grouse law has made law breakers of 95 per cent of the hunters in the woods this fall. The grouse law should by all means be extended and close the same time as the deer law. All hunters feel that they are entitled to at least a few birds in the fall while they are in the woods, especially if they have not been successful in securing other meats. The town sportsmen kill few grouse after September 1, as the birds have moved to higher altitudes and the few birds killed after this date are killed by the deer hunters for camp meat. Therefore, I would recommend that the season for grouse be from August 20 to November 15, with the same bag limit.

Preliminary to their conflict, plenty of first class preliminaries will take place. And then, as a grand finale, the evening will be turned over to tripping the light fantastic, to shaking a wicked toe, or whatever you want to call it. Anyway a dance will be held at both the Zubler and Rex halls and both will be dimmers.
