One of the features of the game came when Lynch returned a Baker kickoff 65 yards. Reider, Baker, was the outstanding star of the visiting team.

In the Union-Imbler game, Union scored in the first quarter and crossed the Imbler goal line at regular intervals thereafter. Baker failed to make a first down from scrimmage unless aided by penalties.

The La Grande second team went into the game at the first and wrestled with the Baker first stringers for about ten minutes and were jerked with the ball in Baker's possession on the one yard line. "Skeet" states that his object in using the second team was to find how strong they were. The blue and white, first team went in, held the Bakerites for downs and punted out of danger. After that the scoring for La Grande came consistently until eleven scores had been pushed across the opponent's line.

Next Saturday La Grande plays Union at Union, Walla Walla invades Pendleton in a game having no bearing on the Eastern Oregon league standings. Enterprise goes to Elgin, Athena plays Umanine, Baker goes to Halfway and Imbler plays Joseph.

Smutz, La Grande center, probably deserves special mention more than the others. Called back on punt formations, he made yardage every time, the smallest gain being five yards. On one play he roared off twenty yards to go for first down. When a team can call back their center and run off twenty yards for first down on the last play then it looks as if the center is some man. Altogether he gained about one hundred yards in his first game as a backfield man this year although he was back only on punt formations.

Russian Children Undergo Delousing by Americans

ODESSA, Russia, Nov. 12.—Skin diseases among the children in the orphanages of this gubernia are yielding to treatment made possible by the drugs supplied by the American Relief Administration, and a general bathing and delousing campaign inaugurated by the same organization has resulted in improving materially the appearance of the thousands of youngsters who have been fed at the American kitchens.

Two months ago, according to Dr. W. K. Smith, district physician of the A. R. A. here, three per cent of the children in institutions were suffering from favus and scabies. The medical division of the A. R. A. prepared a large quantity ointment known as Newman mixture which was distributed to the various homes. Some institutions by preference prepared a sulphur ointment on a petrolatum base from supplies furnished them by the A. R. A. "Since that time," Dr. Smith reports, favus and scabies have lessened in severity to a marked degree. In some of the villages, particularly Marinsky, where one physician is most active, favus is practically absent. The concentrated attention paid to the children's homes and the liberal supplying of them with soap, towels and disinfectants is responsible in large part for their present cleanliness. Not too much emphasis can be laid on the good results effected by frequent visits, inspections, and the general co-operation given by the A. R. A. This is noticed not in the children and patients alone but in the better morale of the personnel.

The bathing of the children began on August 1 in Odessa when 2600 children appeared for the opening of the opening of the bathhouse and left thoroughly scrubbed and with their clothing disinfected. The following day 5,500 received the same treatment and on the eighth day 6,300 children were put through the mill. The total number of baths given in the first nine days of the bathhouse was in operation under A. R. A. auspices was 37,429.
