OREGON HOME COMING WEEK PLANS LARGE

EUGENE, Nov. 12.—Hundreds of graduates and former students of the University of Oregon will journey to Eugene this week from all parts of the Pacific coast for the University's annual homecoming festivities which will open Friday evening and close Saturday night.

The chief attraction of the annual event will be a football game which will be played Saturday afternoon between the Oregon eleven and the Washington State college team. The two institutions are traditional football enemies and are represented this season by two of the strongest teams in the Pacific coast conference. Gridiron critics are not prophesying the outcome of this contest for the teams are so evenly matched that even the most ardent of fans hesitate to give either team the edge. The Oregon will come to Eugene wearing under the white-washed jersey their by the California bears Saturday while the undefeated Oregon eleven will be in the "pink of condition," having had a two week rest. The game promises to be one of the hardest fought gridiron battles ever played in the west.

The contest will be preceded Friday night by a gigantic street parade and bonfire rally. This is an annual event and each year becomes more noisy and hilarious.

Activities day was commemorated with a patriotic parade Saturday morning in which Lane county organizations and students participated. In the afternoon a flag raising and military salute ceremony will be held on Hayward field before the football game is started.

Sixteen hundred graduates and former students of colleges other than Oregon, who are now making their homes in the state were invited to come to Eugene and participate in the Homecoming and at a reception to adopt the university as their alma mater.

NELSON BACK IN LA GRANDE

Delivers Speech to Newport Citizens Telling of City Manager System of City Government.

A. W. Nelson, manager of the Union County Ad. Club, returned to La Grande yesterday after spending a week in Western Oregon, part of it acting as a guest of the city of Newport, where he spoke on the benefits of the city manager form of city government.

The situation in Newport, which is a town of about 800 population, was one of chaos and confusion, and in an effort to get back to a normal basis they decided to use the city manager form of city government. Mr. Nelson, in a speech before a large crowd, explained the benefits that had been derived from the system in La Grande and on the following day Newport adopted the city manager government as a form of city government.

The situation in La Grande, as explained by Mr. Nelson, was in 1915, owing a bonded indebtedness of \$275,000 and a general fund indebtedness of \$187,000, which when the city manager system was adopted, in 1915 the indebtedness had been reduced from \$462,000 to \$38,000 and in 1920 the city was out on a cash basis. The bonded indebtedness has been retroactively reduced and a sinking fund has been created.

In speaking of Western Oregon, Mr. Nelson stated, "fish in Eastern Oregon who think that they are hard up should look at Western Oregon and consider themselves lucky. Today, the county seat of Lincoln county, with a population of slightly over 1,000, has already created a levy of 7 per cent for the coming year, not including the state and county levy which will bring the total to about a per cent. And in Union county a levy of slightly more than 1 per cent is being made and the taxpayers could not believe how hard pressed."

Newport is probably one of the smallest cities in the United States to undertake this form of government, and the experiment will be watched with keen interest. The slogan adopted by the board in Newport was that the city was continually getting deeper in debt and making no improvement under the old form, hence the new could not be worse and might be better.

—pecially in view of the charges made by Pierce against the department during his campaign.

Only slightly less desirable than the highway department jobs are the three industrial accident commissionerships carrying with them salaries of \$3,500 annually, all at the disposal of the governor.

William A. Marshall, republican, has been a member of this commission since its organization in 1914, serving under three governors, but Will T. Kirk, republican, and J. W. Ferguson, democrat, are both Alcott appointees.

The status of the adjutant general, a position now occupied by George A. White at a salary of \$4,500 a year, is also expected to come to issue in the general clean-up. Formerly an office at the disposal of the governor, an amendment to the state's military code, put through during the 1921 legislative session at the instance of White, virtually gives White a life time lease on this highly desirable position. Whether or not this amendment would stand the test of constitutionality and hold White in office in spite of the governor's wishes is a matter of some dispute in the minds of many who have given it consideration.

Other Changes Loos.

The corporation commission, the office of state insurance commissioner and the position of state engineer, now filled by T. B. Handley, A. C. Barber and Percy M. Cupper, respectively, and each carrying salaries of \$3,600 yearly, are all regarded as highly desirable plum at the disposal of the state's chief executive. The position of private secretary to the governor, now filled by Don H. Upham at a salary of \$2,000 a year, will also provide an opening for a supporter of the new administration.

Of the 11 state institutions, only one is directly under the jurisdiction of the governor. This is the state prison with its wardenship, paying \$2,000 a year and "found," and several subordinate positions, all of which are regarded as political plums for the picking of the victor. The heads of the other state institutions are under the jurisdiction of the state board of control, including the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, requiring the action of at least two of these officials to bring about a change.

Training School Plum.

Removal of W. L. Kuser and Mrs. Kuser as superintendent and matron, respectively, of the state training school for boys, or at least a reduction of their salaries, is expected to follow the advent of the new administration. Should this move be attempted, it is highly probable that Pierce would be supported by State Treasurer Hoff, who strenuously opposed the employment of the Kusers when they were brought to Oregon about a year ago to displace Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Gilbert at very material salary advances. With combined salaries aggregating \$5,000 a year and "found," these positions are regarded by many as the most tempting morsels on the state's political menu.

State employees owing their attachment to the public payroll indirectly to their loyalty to the chief executive form a rather lengthy list. Among the most desirable of these might be included the following: Master fish warden, appointed by fish commission, salary \$3,500; state game warden, appointed by game commission, salary \$3,000; state health officer, appointed by state board of health, salary \$4,000; secretary of state fair board, appointed by fair board, salary \$4,000.

These, of course, do not take into consideration the numerous appointments made by a governor to fill vacancies in elective positions due to resignations, deaths, etc., a numerous list in itself.

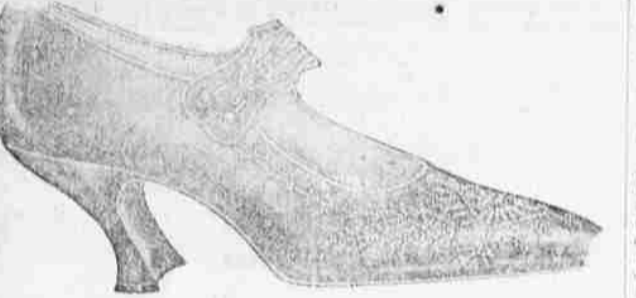
UNION HIGH TO HAVE GYM
