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COVE ELECTS NEW COUNCIL

(Special to the Observer) COVE, Nov. 14.—For almost the first time in its history Cove has elected a woman for its council. Miss Bess Kelley, an assistant in the Cove State bank has been elected as city treasurer.

A good percentage of the voters of the Cove district visited the polls Tuesday, 263 votes being cast, with a majority of 44 for Pierce for governor and 105 for the compulsory school bill. The interest here being centered in these two points.

Much interest was manifested in the city election Tuesday. An effort was being made to change the personnel of the council. J. E. Tripper who has been mayor for the last two years received little opposition.

Mrs. J. B. Welmer, the president of the Woman's Civic Improvement club was written in on many ballots but not enough for election. In the councilmen there was almost a radical change, but one of the old councilmen, J. B. Welmer, being re-elected. The men named in several instances are from a younger men, some of these being in their early twenties. They are as follows: R. J. Stackland, T. J. Conklin, John Williams, Joe Jovette and Alvin Orton. For recorder, R. F. Musick was elected.
