Receives Samples.—The county agricultural office is in receipt of some samples of inoculated sulphur and some commercial flour sulphur supplied by the Texas Gulf and Sulphur company. They will be used in the county in various fields of alfalfa and clover to test the value of the inoculated sulphur in comparison with commercial flour sulphur and plaster. Claims have been made that the inoculated sulphur is more readily available to the plant and that better results are secured than by the ordinary type that is in common use.

WHEREAS, Said election was duly and regularly held, and after said election the returns of said election were duly and regularly canvassed and from said canvass it is shown and appears that Sherwood Williams and C. J. Black each received a majority of the votes cast at said election, and that each was duly elected as Commissioner of the City of La Grande for the term beginning January 2nd, 1923, now, therefore,

I, Sherwood Williams, President of the City of La Grande do hereby declare and proclaim that Sherwood Williams and C. J. Black are the duly elected Commissioners, duly elected at said election for the term beginning January 2nd, 1923, and

WHEREAS, From the canvass of said election it is shown and appears that a majority of the legal votes cast at said election upon the question of the proposed charter amendments were cast in favor thereof,

NOW THEREFORE, I, Sherwood Williams, President of the said City of La Grande, as by law provided, do hereby declare and proclaim that the following Acts submitted to the electors of said City at said election, to-wit:—

An Act to amend Sections 6 and 7, Chapter 2, of the City Charter as amended at the general election in said City on December 12th, 1915.
