LAND GRANT COLLEGE ASSOCIATION TO MEET

(The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.— The Association of Land-Grant Colleges will hold its 35th annual convention here during the week of November 29. The convention will be attended by representatives of the teaching, research, and extension organizations of the land-grant institutions with which the United States department of agriculture will participate in the program. The session will give attention to many problems of interest relating to organization and administration of research and extension work in agriculture, home economics and rural engineering. Sectional meetings will discuss agricultural problems generally, resident teaching, experimental station work, extension work and engineering and home economics.

The association had its inception at a convention of agricultural college and experimental station representatives in this city in 1887. Officials say it has been a powerful influence in promoting and unifying agricultural education and research in the United States and in securing more effective co-operation of the agencies engaged in such work. Officers of the association are: president, T. D. Boyd, president Louisiana State University; vice-president, A. A. Potter, dean, school of engineering, Purdue University; secretary-treasurer, J. L. Hills, dean, college of agriculture, University of Vermont.
