UNION BUDGET IS PREPARED

Total Estimate About \$18,000; Arrangements for Chautauqua Being Made; Gymnasium Being Rushed to Completion.

UNION, Nov. 21.—William Campbell took a truck load of Ganey apples to Eaker last week. He reports a ready sale for this quality of apples.

The budget for the city of Union for the year 1923 was adopted by the budget committee of the council at an adjourned meeting last Tuesday evening. The total estimate for the year is a little better than \$18,000. Of this amount, about one-third will go for interest on bonds and another thousand will be used to retire some of these bonds. Salaries, lights and city water expenses require another third of the budget. The remainder is divided among several items. The bulk of this money will have to be raised by taxation, as the estimated amount of water rent, license and fines is only about \$4,000.
