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TURKS WANT BACK 1913 FRONTIERS

Disposition of the Western Part of Thrace Before the Powers Today.

GREECE OPPOSES TURKEY'S CLAIM

Syria Demands that Conference Grant Their Country Independence Instead of Mandatory Status.

LAURANNE, Nov. 22.—The question of the disposition of western Thrace came before the powers today when Ismet Pasha presented Turkey's claim to all territory embraced within her frontiers in the year of 1913. Venizelos, of Greece, opposed the claim and was supported by the Anglo-Syria and French mandates who favored maintaining the Moritza river as the western boundary of Turkey in Europe, and the agreed there should not even be a plebiscite to decide the sovereignty of the disputed territory. A delegation from Syria demanding that the conference grant their country independence instead of the status of French mandatory given them by the Allied Supreme Council in 1920. The efforts of the Turkish delegation for open sessions and complete publicity were overruled. News announcements will be limited to formal communiques.

MANY BABIES NOT DEFECTIVE

County Nurse and Dr. Warner Conduct Clinics in Union County; 26 Babies Were Free from Defects.

The report presented by the public health nurse of Union county on the clinic work that has been done in the past week is one of interest. Twelve babies were examined at North Powder, two of them were found 100 per cent perfect, three had slight defects, while the others were in need of a doctor's care. Of thirty that were examined at Union, eleven of them were 100 per cent babies. At Elgin seven babies were 100 per cent out of twenty examined. In La Grande, only six out of 29 examined proved to be 100 per cent well. This gives a total of 91 pre-school children receiving free examination and advice by one of our most capable physicians, Dr. Estelle Ford Warner, the medical director of child hygiene in this state. Only twenty-six of these ninety-one babies were found 100 per cent free from defects, which goes to prove that the need of these clinics is great and every effort will be made to continue them every two or three months. The county nurse's forces appreciate the response from the local physicians who aided them materially in their clinics.

The War Premier of France Says Prussians Plan to Upset Democracy; New War Plot Laid to Berlin

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—The police escort assigned Georges Clemenceau during his stay in the United States was doubled today when the Tiger received a letter threatening his life signed a "world war veteran."

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—The militarists of Germany already are preparing another war, Georges Clemenceau, war premier of France, declared last night in the first address of his American tour. The Tiger of France, speaking fervently at the Metropolitan opera house, reviewed the situation in Europe, pointing to a reapprochement of the Turks and soviet Russia as ominous war clouds.

German Coup Suspected, Ludendorff and other German militarists were planning a coup against the democratic government there. Describing the present as a time of "great crisis," he urged that the United States should renew conversations with France and England, which, without definitely committing this country to any set programme, would present to Germany a picture of the three unpleasant folks who faced her in the war.

Appeals to America
NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Georges Clemenceau today expressed the hope that the United States might establish a plan as to what was to be done in carrying out the terms of the peace treaty and join with England and France in imposing it upon Germany.

COMMISSION NET GAINS
PORTLAND, Nov. 22.—The operation of over two hundred trucks given the highway commission by the federal government, netted the commission \$75,000 last year and \$52,000 so far this year. Secretary Klein reported at the meeting today. The commission operates trucks hauling gravel and rock, and charges contractors for the use of them. The commission announced its willingness to release trucks to counties on the same terms.

MANILA, Nov. 22.—President Harding and congress will be petitioned to allow the Philippine legislature to call a constitutional convention to frame an independent republic. The house here today adopted a resolution to that effect that was passed by the senate three weeks ago.

"They will be made with capital obtained by Southern Pacific credit if the supreme court decision ordering the dissolution of the two railroads is set aside."
