MOSER JOINS UPTON TODAY RACE CLOSED

Senators Shocked by Moser
Switching to Jay
Upton

SUPPORT OF MOSER COMPLICATES RACE

May Lose Upton More Votes
Than He Brings; Wire is
Busy Ascertaining Atti-
tude of Members.

(Special to Observer.)

PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—Wornout from the tangle over the senate presidency, the few state senators who are in Portland, were shocked early this morning when Senator Gus Moser, who has been an out-cast from both camps for three days, announced publicly he will support Senator Jay Upton for the presidency. With Upton's fifteen the Moser vote would be sixteen or enough to name him, provided an agreement with Eddy camp which provided that neither Upton or Eddy supporters would deal with Moser, does not lose Upton more votes than Moser brings.

This is a feature that is entering into the middle today and telephone and telegraph wires are busy trying to learn just how members feel.

It is understood a number of eastern Oregon senators have wired in that while Upton has their support the agreement with the Eddy camp to the effect that Moser not be dealt with must be lived up to. Delay in settling the presidency of the senate seems apparent now.

As for Moser, his estimates in the corn belt may be developed later. A semi-annual estimate of the prospective crop of cattle for spring and delivery will be made in February and August.

La Grande-Pendleton Auto Stage Wrecked

An accident that might have proved much more serious occurred yesterday five miles southeast of Mission on the Cabbage Hill grade, when the La Grande-Pendleton auto stage turned over going off the ice grade. The car was completely wrecked and G. W. Baars, proprietor and driver, and Hal Flora, of La Grande, and W. B. Ross, of Mosch, the only occupants were injured. Mr. Flora, who was probably injured more seriously than the others, is now at his home in La Grande, and although his injuries are serious, they are not considered dangerous. Mr. Baars and Mr. Ross are only slightly injured.

The accident occurred on the first trip from La Grande, the accident as described by Mr. Baars, occurring as follows: "We were going along at a slow speed when we met a Ford, which was on the wrong side of the road. In attempting to pass and to stop the car, the wheels slid onto the ice grade and the car turned over. It continued, the first accident I have had during the twelve years I have been driving. Had we not been going at a slow rate of speed, the accident might have proved very serious and although his injuries are serious, they are not considered dangerous. The car, especially the top, was damaged considerably."

DISSOLUTION IS FAVORED BY UNION PACIFIC

Counsel for the U. P. Today
Cross Examines Witnesses
Before Interstate Commerce
Commission.

Clark, chief counsel for the Union Pacific today in the interstate commerce commission, cross examined witnesses, seeking to bring out the advantages of dissolution.

BAKER MINE IS BIG PRODUCER

Ships 60th Car of Crude Silver
Ore to Kellogg Smelter;
One of Biggest in the
Country.

BAKER, Nov. 24.—In the Bay Horse mine, Baker county has what is perhaps destined to become one of the greatest silver producing mines in the United States. The wonderful record made by the property since shipping the first carload of ore the 16th of last May, is one of the wonders of mining men, who are familiar with the mine.

A few days ago the 60th car of crude ore was shipped from the mine to the Kellogg Hill-Sullivan smelter at Kellogg, Idaho. The gross value of the shipments is more than \$10,000, and it is understood more than 50 per cent of this amount is held in the treasury of the company.

A great deal of credit for the success so far attained with the property is due to Pete Miller, who has been in charge of the work from the first. Mr. Miller took hold of the property about two years ago. At that time the mine had been abandoned for many years and its location was all but forgotten. He succeeded in locating the workings and uncovered parts of the ledge, and later mined the mine to the E. S. PRISONER SAYS WAY TO LIBERTY

Check Artist Escapes from
County Jail at Baker;
Outside Help is Suspected

BAKER, Nov. 24.—C. W. Johnson, under arrest for obtaining money under false pretenses, made his escape from the county jail some time last night, by sawing out two bars in the window in the west side of the jail on the third floor of the court house. It is presumed Johnson was given a saw by an outside accomplice, although there is no positive proof. When the prisoners were locked up for the night it is thought Johnson hid on the top of a rear cage, and as there is another prisoner whom greatly resembles Johnson his disappearance was unnoticed.

Johnson was arrested in Spokane and is wanted in several coast cities, particularly in California, where there is a felony warrant awaiting him. According to Sheriff George A. Herbert, officers along the line, both east and west, have been notified of the escape and have been given a description of the fugitive.

GOVERNMENT TO RECOVER WAR FUNDS

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—Legal action to recover more than \$20,000,000 alleged to have been obtained fraudulently from the government in the construction of four army cantonments during the war was instituted today by Attorney General Daugherty as the first formal step in a far-reaching prosecution of those who held the contracts for the building of the war camps.

Other civil actions and possibly criminal prosecution to follow involving a total of more than \$75,000,000, reaching virtually every part of the country are in action. The camps involved in today's action are: Camp Upton, N. Y.; Camp Jackson, S. C.; Camp Sherman, O.; and Camp Funston, Kansas.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—A series of suits for the recovery of money expended for the construction of war cantonments has been decided as the next step in the governmental campaign against the alleged frauds under the war contracts.

The number of suits to be filed has been definitely decided, but it was indicated that dozens or more separate actions were planned.

The initial cases solve the contention of camps in the Southern States.

PRIMARY ROADS NAMED

PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—The highway commissioners indicated this morning in conference with the federal road engineer Purcell that they would be obliged to place the Walla Walla cutoff on the Oregon road map in view of the action of the state of Washington in approving the route. LOCAL TEAM LOOKS FOR A HARD GAME

Wallowa's Strength is Not a
Myth; Size, Speed and
Punch are Possessed By
Invaders.

La Grande will muster her full gridiron strength against Wallowa Saturday afternoon. Two games stand between them and a right to play Athena for the championship, and of the two, the Wallowa game is classed as being much more important. If La Grande wins from Wallowa by a decisive score, she should be able to snow Enterprise under with several touchdowns.

"Shoot" is hopeful, but far from sure, of a victory. La Grande defeated Elgin 23 to 0 early in the season. Since then Elgin defeated Wallowa 16 to 4 with Elgin's team being improved one hundred per cent, especially in its attack. Of the two games, La Grande in favored a victor by a few points. La Grande will have another advantage in having the game on her own grounds.

Lineup Strongest.

The strongest lineup La Grande has presented this year will face the Wallowans when they take the field. Smith at center, will be flanked by R. Garrity and Hammett; Hart and McClure will play one tackle and Captain Alstott will flank the other guard. On the ends Bokland and Boarden. Two consistent men, will be found.

The backfield will be considerably strengthened over last Saturday's game with Tige Larsen, sensational kicker and possessor of the triple threat, back in the lineup. He may not enter at first but he is sufficiently improved to be able to play part of the game. His forty and forty-five yard punts have played an important part in La Grande's past games. Sherwood and C. Garrity will be at their regular positions as halfbacks and either Lynch or Metcalf will play quarterback. Howard Kerr, the young phenom, may start in place of Larson, or may wait on the sidelines until needed. Kerr is a comer and has made quite a record for himself this season.

Wallowa Strong.

Wallowa is no set-up! Far be it from that. In fact they are expected to be the hardest team La Grande has locked horns with since early in the season. They have a whirlwind attack centered about McGinnis, their huge fullback, and when they get going, it is hard to stop them. They have the weight, the speed and the punch and if La Grande lets up for a single minute, look out.

That they were able to score two safeties on Elgin shows that they are to be reckoned with. Elgin's defense is one of the best in eastern Oregon and when Wallowa was able to pierce the defense twice for safeties, it is unwise to underestimate their power. And that their defense is equally good may be seen from the fact that Elgin, after a 57 to 0 defeat of Enterprise, was able to score only two touchdowns and a field goal.

The game will be called Saturday afternoon at the high school ground at 2:30 o'clock.
