How Aluminum Occurs

Aluminum is not found in a pure form, but in combination, chiefly as an oxide in the mineral compounds (trilite, nepheline and emery); hydrated oxide in bauxite, hydrogarnite and diaspore; hydrated phosphate in wavelite; hydrous silicate in combination with potash in alundite and in combination with oxygen and silica as amorphous, as in opal, chrysotile and talc. HAVE FAITH IN AMERICA SAYS BABSON

Statistician Believes That Present Stock Market Slump Temporary

WELLESLEY HILLS, Nov. 25.—Many traders have decided that the stock market has turned definitely downward and have sold their holdings. Others are hanging on and hoping. The following statement made today by Roger W. Babson would indicate that fundamental conditions substantiate the beliefs of those who are still optimistic.

"There is a feeling in many quarters that the case in the market is over," says Mr. Babson, "and that it is headed for a long panic. I am being asked on every hand for my opinion and I want to go on record as taking the opposite position. The long swing upward movement which started in August, 1921, is not over. I am concerned with the minor movements of the market. I don't know anything about them and no one else does. The market may have further declines before it goes higher. Statistics show, however, that the market is due to go to higher levels in 1922 or 1923 before it starts on another long downward swing such as we had in 1920.

"I admit that when one looks at surface conditions today, there are many things that tend to confirm the current bearish sentiment. The principal bear argument that is being used, in the European situation, it is difficult for most people to see how conditions in the United States can improve much without an increase in our foreign trade. In the European situation and in the Tariff Act they see little encouragement in this direction. Other bearish arguments being put forward are: the high commodity prices level that still exists, the failure of wheat to come down, the re-rolling tendency of corn, the small margin of profit in many lines, the poor outlook for certain industries, and political conditions.

"But did anybody ever make money in the stock market by following surface conditions? I never heard that they did. Did surface conditions look rosy back in December, 1920, and during 1921 when the market was at its lowest for 27 years? It certainly did not. There were just as many calamity howlers then as there are now. The European situation and the domestic developments as there are today. In the case of all these things, the market has had a rise of over 50 per cent in the past few months. It may be argued that the market had no chance to rise up to this extent and that because it has risen up so much it is in a dangerous position. The stock market, however, never could have had any such rise as it did if underlying conditions had not been sound. This position in the market is based on underlying conditions and not on surface conditions. The same fundamental statistics that tell us to be bullish on stocks in 1921 indicate that the long swing movement is not yet over.

"Of course, I don't mean to say that all classes of stocks are necessarily going higher, or that the market will turn higher right away. There are certain groups that may have already seen their top. Judging from the statistical position of the industry of commodity which they represent, I should not be surprised if these did not do so very soon on the basis of the present movement, as if they even sagged. Because of the very uneven registration that we have been through, the various groups of stocks are not

HELIX ASKING FOR NEW ROAD

PENIDOTTON, Nov. 24.—The desire of securing the Vancouver road as a market road and improving it for the benefit of wheat farmers are stressed in an important letter to a meeting and banquet of the Helix Commercial club, membership last night, according to a statement made today by Joseph Bell and James Hill of Penidotton, who were present at the meeting.

Approximately \$75,000 worth of wheat are handled up this grade every year, according to the meeting speakers, but the grade is in practically the same condition now that it was 25 years ago. Some of the farmers in that district have to haul 10 and 12 miles to get their wheat to the market. It was stated, and this fact had been over and over again, that the road must be changed to the better condition.

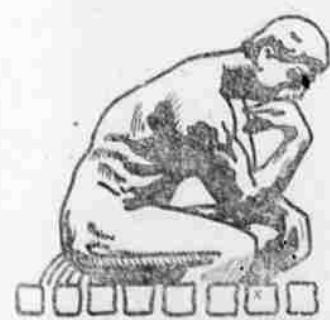
