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"PISTOLS; LADIES' SIZE"

Philadelphia Public Ledger: Testimony presented yesterday in a homicide trial in this city revealed the interesting fact that revolvers of "25 caliber" are "oftenest purchased by ladies." These weapons are small and neat. They have a de luxe air. And, as some one pointed out at another murder trial not long ago, they can be conveniently carried in a handbag, in a muff or "even in the hair."

NEW ENGLAND CONSCIENCE

Hartford Times: Much water has flowed under the bridge since people started away in vain efforts to determine whether or not they had "sinned against the Holy Ghost." What was the New England conscience is not a Freudian complex, and it is doubtful whether anybody in these days is more than necessarily concerned with the possibility of having sinned.

Innocence as the habit of morbid self-searching undoubtedly is, it is probably no more dangerous than the neglect of the soul, as a field for cultivation, which rather characterizes the present generation. Even when we read, we must make or eat, as if we were afraid of an unanticipated reality, as if we were afraid of what the soul might get away with it not occupied with some diversion of the vasomotor nervous system or the alimentary canal. Have we any more serenity than the dear old spinners of a generation which now seems as remote as the ancient Aeneas? Probably nobody will ever find out.
