

UNION ENDS GRID SEASON

Season Ends With Five Defeats and Three Victories; May Contest One Game.

UNION, Nov. 28. (Special)—Union high school wound up its football season Saturday afternoon with a double header on the local ground, the first team playing the game scheduled with Elgin, and the second team putting on a preliminary with the timber scouts. Our second team this year is made up almost entirely of small players and although they put up a game fight, the timber scouts proved in making a touchdown in the first half. The remainder of the game was scoreless and very evenly played. Final score, 7-0. When the Elgin boys trotted out on the field it was soon evident that in addition to being slightly heavier than the local boys, they were also faster. They made most of their points by means of end runs, which the Union team seemed unable to stop. Tucker was easily the star of the visiting team, making most of the long runs and showing up fine in the starting game whenever Union had the ball. Union tried the forward pass several times but owing to the brisk wind and the quick interference of the visitors only two or three passes were completed. What yardage was gained was by straight line kicking, except for the few forward passes. Elgin used one forward pass and the ball nosed out of the receiver's hands and was caught by a Union player. In less than five minutes the play was repeated, this time the other way around. Toward the middle of the contest we made a touchdown and a second one almost at the end of the last quarter. Elgin struck out for six touchdowns, which with our extra point, made the final score, 37-12 in favor of the visitors. This game ended the season for Union. During the season we played eight games and won three, with one game probably to be contested. If the other school has to forfeit that game on account of playing ineligible, we shall have broken even. Otherwise the season stands for Union, 3 won and 5 lost.

According to the estimate made out for the present school year, District No. 5 will expend about \$38,800 for the total expense of running the schools. Of this total about \$20,000 is being paid out for teachers' salaries. Owing to a reduction in expenses, mainly in salaries, this year's expense for the district will be between four and five thousand dollars less than last year's.

This evening Union begins a five-evening Edisson-White chautauqua festival. The meetings will be held in the Methodist church.

Mainly owing to the inability to find a building large enough to hold the people who would probably have attended, the community Christmas tree and program was given up for the present year. Before another Christmas reaches us, Union will have a suitable building for all such occasions, as the gymnasium will be finished by about the first of the year. The floor space in this will seat about 1200. Work is progressing on the framework. A nine-inch concrete foundation was made by the students in about four days, working in shifts between classes.

Mr. and Mrs. Claude Ficklin, formerly residing in Union, but now of La Grande, were initiated into the local Eastern Star lodge last Wednesday. The initiatory ceremonies were followed by a social good time and a lunch.

LUMBER DEMAND IS QUITE BRISK

A strong demand continues to feature the lumber market, the manufacturers being able to book more business than they can handle promptly, partly because car shortage has severely restricted shipments but also because the demand is unusually large for the season and is on a firm business basis, not speculative. The supply of cars is not yet large enough to enable lumber producers to ship to capacity, although it has improved somewhat, especially in the South. Many orders have to be turned down because shipment cannot be made, as the mills continue their policy of accepting only such business as can be taken care of by the car supply immediately in prospect.

A careful investigation as to stocks in the major producing regions, says the American Lumberman, reveals an unusually small amount of lumber available for sale. Mill stocks, in addition to being small, are poorly assorted; some grades and workings are unobtainable while others are in fair supply. Placing orders for badly mixed cuts is, therefore, extremely difficult, so that buyers have to shop
