HELPING THE EMIGRANT—NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—One of the hardest tasks that confront officials at the immigration station on Ellis Island, and one about which least is said is that of keeping thousands of children that pass through the island amused. Charles Carol, chairman of the representatives of the twenty welfare organizations working on Ellis Island, speaks several languages, and for the New York Bible Society, has been engaged for eleven years distributing Bibles to newcomers. "One of our biggest tasks," he said, "is to keep the newcomers occupied. For the children we have many means of diversion. The small children attend kindergartens, where they are taught to know the American flag first of all. The older children attend classes in English and for the girls there are classes in sewing. Near the water, where the kiddies can get plenty of fresh air, there is a large playground with swings and see-saws."
