

MANY EVADE REVENUE LAW

PORTLAND, Nov. 28.—Many organizations entitled to exemptions from tax on admissions are not complying with an important provision of the revenue law by which that exemption can be obtained," said Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, today. "In order to secure this tax exemption, it is necessary for the organization desiring the same to file with this office, several days in advance of the date of the entertainment, an affidavit claiming exemption and establishing the right of the beneficiary to be relieved from the payment of the tax."

Failure to make formal application and receive exemption from payment of the admission tax in advance of the entertainment makes the person or authority giving the entertainment liable to a penalty of not more than \$1000. If this failure is willful, the offender may be fined \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than one year, or both.

Organizations entitled to this exemption upon compliance with the provision of the revenue law referred to by collector Huntley include religious, charitable, and educational societies or institutions, the American Legion, societies for the prevention of cruelty to children and animals, agricultural fair associations, and community improvement societies, and then only when all of the proceeds of the entertainment inure to the benefit of any one or more of the organizations enumerated.
