\$3.95 DRESS WINS FIRST PRIZE

Junction City Girl Shows Remarkable Skill in Use of Needle.

CORVALLIS, Nov. 29.—Marjorie Stone, of Junction City, sophomore in home economics, won a \$25 prize in a young girls' dress design contest conducted by the Woman's Home Companion. Announcement of the winners appeared in the December issue. Miss Stone submitted a design in wood-brown rayon, trimmed with zig-zag lines of rose, tan, and lavender yarns couched on with brown yarn. The design was selected from one of her frequent problems.

The cost of the dress was limited to \$5. Miss Stone was able to cut the price down to \$3.95, the lowest price of any dress submitted in the contest.

The seventh annual Hort show was formally opened Thursday night. The Oregon State Horticultural society and the Western Nurseries association opened their annual convention on the campus at the same time. Scite was a feature of this year's show. Sixty finest varieties are on display—believed to be the largest collection ever brought together. Thirty-five are Oregon varieties, 15 from eastern states, and the rest from California. A large variety of English shipment have been forwarded.

Working demonstrations of apple packing and plant propagation are carried on in the basement of agricultural hall. H. A. Reardon, extension specialist in bee culture, will give beekeeping demonstrations. The mushroom show by the department of botany and plant pathology consists of a large number of both edible and poisonous mushrooms.

Canning and dehydrating demonstrations are given in the horticultural exhibits building, where the new recalculation drier, developed by the department.

Orchard tractors, spraying machines, and dusting machines are exhibited by several commercial concerns in the farm mechanics building. Spraying and dusting demonstrations are given in the old college orchard.
