INDIAN RACE NOT DYING

According to E. B. Merritt, assistant Indian commissioner at Washington, the 240,517 Indians now in the United States represent an increase approximately of 13,500 over the number ten years ago.

It is stated the increase has been brought about by improving housing conditions and increased hospital and medical facilities. There are 78 hospitals at the Indian reservations and schools and there are employed in the Indian service 150 physicians, 81 nurses and 70 field matrons, the latter visiting the homes of the Indians to improve conditions.

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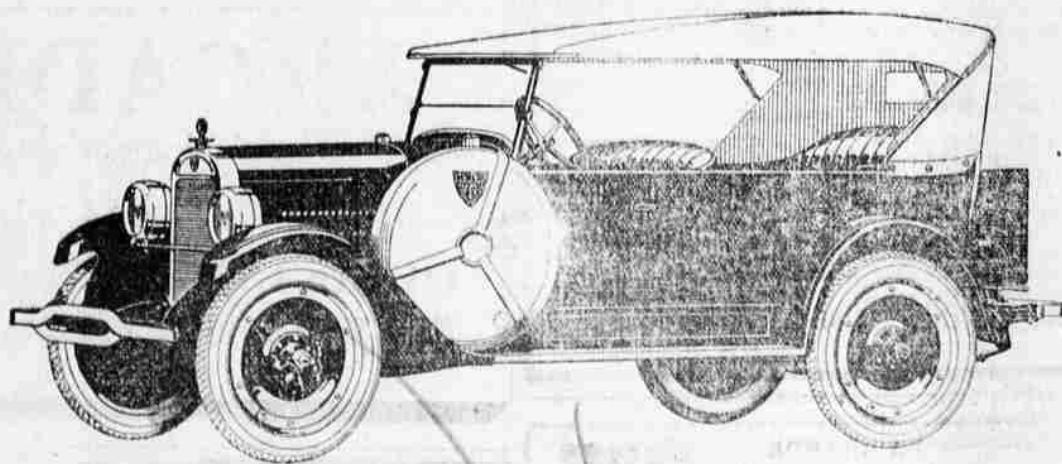
