

HIGHWAY PLANS ARE NOW READY

ENTERPRISE, Dec. 6.—Business of spending all last week on Portland and holding a series of conferences with state and federal highway officials, the county court returned with the county's future highway program defined and settled. Agreements were made in this momentous week to this effect:

The state highway commission will carry through the financing of the remaining section of the valley highway as verbally arranged last summer, all misunderstandings having been wiped out.

The Flors road, from Enterprise to the south end of the forest road, remains on the state as the next state highway to be constructed in Walla-walla county.

The forest service designated the extension of the north road, from the north terminus of the present forest highway to the state line, for construction immediately after projects now under way have been completed.

Washington Also Acts
Fitting into this schedule, as an integral part of the interstate highway to the north, was the action of the Eastern Washington Highway association, in session at Spokane November 18, which ratified the proceedings of the earlier Washington state meeting and recommended to the routing of the state line.

A branch of the eastern division of the inland Empire highway, south of the Flors road, in Asotin county, to a point connecting with the Oregon system on the southern line of Asotin county, is added to the state road system.

The county court went to Portland today if we must say so, to ascertain that the contract be entered into from the relations between Walla-walla county and the state highway commission and between the county and the forest service. Changes will be made the first of the year in the county court, from which Ernest E. Johnson will retire, and also, presumably, in the state commission when Walter M. Pierce takes office as governor. The incomplete highway valley has been built by state and county under verbal agreements, which have not always been understood alike on the two sides.

Finances Were in Tangle.
Since the contract was let for the last section, between Enterprise and W. W. Wain's farm, a serious tangle had arisen. The county took the contract, after it had been agreed that state and county would divide the cost equally, and the state would advance enough of the county's part so that the county would have two years in which to pay its half. The county had stated up for two-thirds of the portion and half of the county's.

When bills for the work were sent to the state commission, however, the state paid only its half, leaving the county's part unpaid. After this had gone on for a short time the county was out of funds and was placed in a predicament, particularly as it had been called on, in its capacity of general contractor, to make advancements to subcontractors.

OMAHA, Neb., Dec. 6.—The American State bank of Omaha, capitalized at \$200,000, was closed Monday by J. E. Hart, secretary of the state department of trade and commerce. Mr. Hart issued a statement saying the bank's capital was "hopelessly dissipated and the directors and shareholders were unwilling and unable to make good the impairment."

The bank had deposits of \$1,100,000, loans of \$1,000,000 and \$500,000 worth of "bad paper," according to Mr. Hart.

BANDIT'S WORK AROUSES PEOPLE

SALT LAKE, Dec. 5.—Ruler C. James, 16-year-old high school student, was shot and instantly killed Saturday night by one of a supposed quartet of bandits during an attempted holdup of the D. & D. drug store. Following the killing there was a running fight between the holdups and J. C. Donovan, owner of the store. Donovan was not injured, however, and it is apparent

that he was unable to hit the thug. Police reserves were called in, and neighboring towns notified of the escaping bandits. It was thought they went north, but they had not been captured Monday, although a concerted effort has been made to head them off.

This killing, following the shooting of Sgt. N. P. Pierce of the police department, a week ago, by a bandit, has thoroughly aroused the people of Salt Lake. Pierce was shot

while looking for holdups, and he and another policeman were surprised by two thugs who shot Pierce and beat his companion into insensibility. These also escaped. Pierce is still alive, but in a precarious condition, and if he lives, will be a cripple, the thug's bullet having pierced his spinal column.
