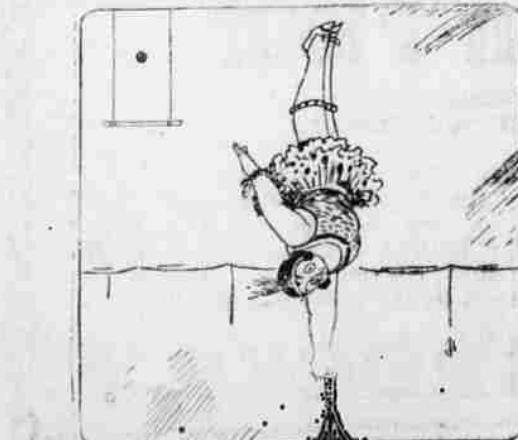

Constance Talmadge in her latest First National attraction, "The Primitive Lover," will be the feature at the Arcade Theatre Thursday Friday and Saturday. This is from an original story by Edgar Selwyn.

The star plays the role of a romance-stricken wife who abhors the idea of domesticity and household routine. Her thoughts run to the gallant romance of bygone days which she absorbs from all the best sellers that the library shelf holds.

SONG OF THE STORM

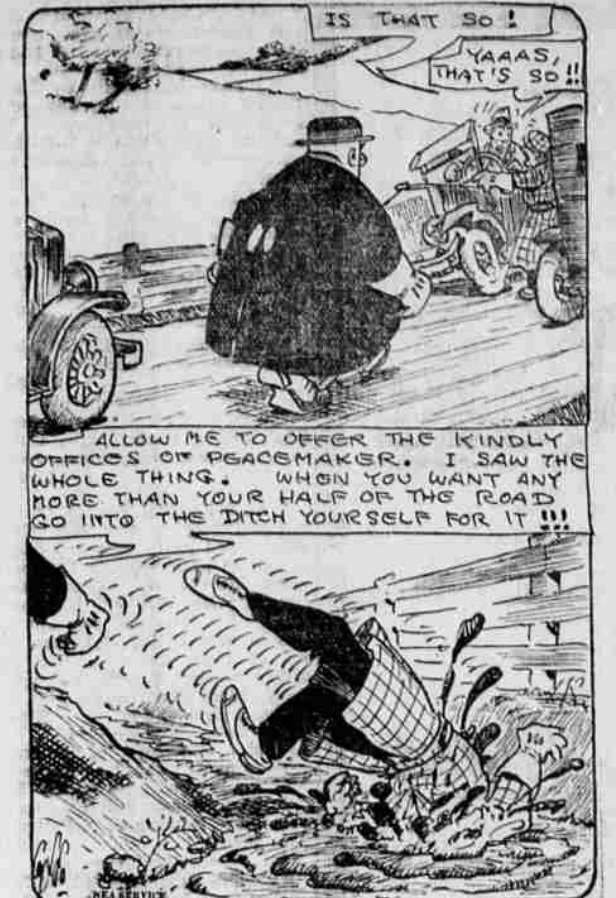

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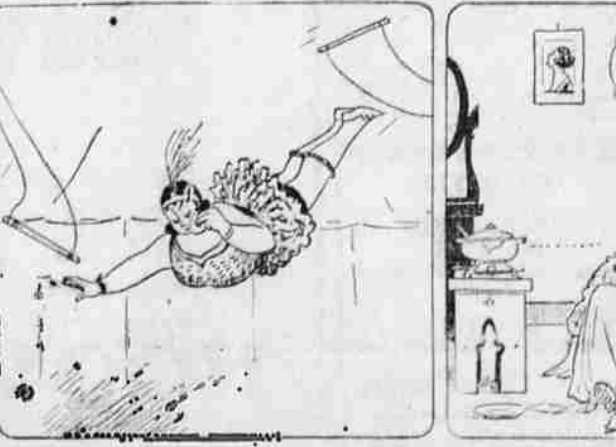
