

BAKER WILL BE REPRESENTED

Fifteen Boys Will Attend Older Boys' Conference to Be Held in La Grande.

Fifteen boys are signed up to attend the Older Boys conference at La Grande beginning Friday afternoon of this week, states the Baker Herald. They will leave Baker shortly after noon on the opening day and arrive in La Grande in time for the opening session.

Delegations will attend from Huntington, Baker, Haines, North Powder, Union, Pendleton and all of the outlying towns as well as from along the Columbia River.

A similar conference is now in session at Eugene, Oregon, for the boys of Western Oregon.

A fine program is being arranged. Harold Trebbe of Baker, vice president of the conference which met at Boise last year and president of the local Hi Y club from which the largest number of delegates will attend from Baker will respond to the address of welcome in the opening session of the conference.

All boys of this city, who are considering attending the conference should notify Mr. Webster, secretary of the Baker Y. M. C. A. at once as means of transportation must be arranged for. The only expense to the delegates will be \$1.00 registration fee.

Entertainment of the boys while in La Grande will be taken care of by the people of La Grande and by the conference management.

The gathering is held under the auspices of the state committee of the Y. M. C. A.

RICHLAND, Ore., Dec. 7.—Funeral services over the remains of Oscar Kendall, postmaster of this city, who committed suicide about 10 o'clock Tuesday morning in the rear of the postoffice by shooting himself thru the right temple with a .32-calibre revolver, will be held at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Mr. Kendall, previous to his act had made no mention of his intention to take his life but it is believed that worry over his poor health was the cause. His accounts as postmaster are believed to be in perfect condition and it was with the deepest regret that Mr. Kendall's many friends in this section learned of his death.

LEGION OPPOSES BORAH'S STAND

BALTIMORE, Dec. 7.—Alvin M. Owsley, national commander of the American Legion, Sunday called for a unified stand of the legion against the release of political prisoners and against recognition of the Russian government in an address to the Woutfaucen post.

"There is," he declared, "a great wave of radicalism abroad which you and I must do everything to check. Whether this radicalism is because the tension of the war has been let down, or because unemployment or both, it is nevertheless a serious fact. We read of big meetings like the one in New York, where distinguished gentlemen, including a United States senator from Idaho, spoke

openly for general amnesty for political prisoners and for a recognition of the soviet government. "The Legion is opposed as unalterably to their release as it is to any recognition of the present Russian governments."
