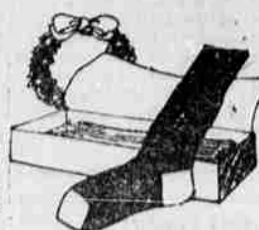

At seven o'clock three addresses of welcome, one by Rev. G. H. Quigley, one by Francis Robinson, and one by Sherwood Williams, will greet the delegates. H. H. Trehe, of Baker will respond.

At seven thirty an election and installation of officers will take place and Rev. George Clark, formerly of La Grande but now of Pendleton, will deliver the address of the evening. "The Need for Friendship in the World Program." Rev. Clark is a speaker of exceptional ability and his address is being looked forward to as one of the bright lights of the conference.

in the heart of the business district. One life was lost, Norris Staples, automobile dealer and president of the bank of commerce, dropped dead.

Financial loss is estimated all the way from four to fifteen millions.

At nine o'clock all the district between Astor street at the river front south to Exchange street and east and west between Eighth and Sixteenth streets devastated. The fire penetrated between Eleventh and Twelfth as far as Franklin street.

Fire Chief Foster said the fire got out of control because it burned beneath buildings under piling, which had not been filled in when the city was built on piles, and he attributed the disaster to this fact.

Most of the buildings burned were frame but the city's substantial brick buildings also are gone, including the Astoria Savings Bank, Weinhard Hotel, Astoria Budget building, Elks Temple, Astoria National Bank, Staples Motor company, Saco Motor company, Shellroad Dry Goods store. All docks were saved.

The rain was falling most of the time and no wind was present.
