### AIRPLANE USED FOR SICK LADY

BOISE, Dec. 10.—Antitoxin ordered by W. H. Almond, state medical adviser, to prevent botulism poisoning of Mrs. L. B. Schaefer of Hatley, is expected to arrive at Hatley Saturday morning, Doctor Almond said Friday.

The medicine is coming by airplane mail as far as Cheyenne, Wyo., and will be forwarded to Hatley as fast as possible from there. Doctor Almond said he was going to call Hatley Saturday morning to see if it had arrived.

Mrs. Schaefer has been sick since the day following Thanksgiving, when she tasted some corn canned in her own home. At first she was afflicted with a slight paralysis of the tongue.

It remains a question of the dread disease, which killed six members of the Tuttle family at Cambridge about a year ago. This was successfully combated by physicians, and then she was taken with partial paralysis of the throat, from which she is now suffering. The anti-toxin is supposed to relieve this condition.

The remainder of the corn of which Mrs. Schaefer tasted was thrown out, and 25 out of 10 chickens which ate it died.
