DEATH CALLS MERCHANT OF WORLD FAME

In advertising, in newspaper advertising above all other varieties. He spent millions of dollars in it. One of the features of his advertising campaign was his development of the "Photo Sales Page" which he led with an editorial never his own signature, invariably written by himself, to keep the public in touch with the policies of the business. His friends often saw him writing such an editorial on his way to the store in the morning, scribbling it on the back of an envelope or any odd scrap of paper he had in his pocket.

He was always looking for better and newer ways of doing business and came from providing convenience for buyers and securing able management. Mr. Wanamaker paid great attention to the welfare of his employees, establishing among them many institutions for cultivating a spirit of comradeship, encouraging them to improve their earning capacity, providing retirement of old employees on retired pay, and creating a court of appeal chosen by employees to which any complaint could be taken.

One of the greatest tributes ever paid to an American merchant was that given to Mr. Wanamaker in the fall of 1911 on the fiftieth anniversary of his business career. Thirteen thousand of his employees from both the New York and Philadelphia stores greeted him in his Philadelphia store and presented him with the house in which he was born, and a jubilee book in which each of the thirteen thousand had written their names.

Politically Successful.
In political life Mr. Wanamaker was prominent as an independent Republican. In 1857 he was offered the Republican nomination as congressman-at-large for the state of Pennsylvania, but declined it, and in 1875 he declined to become an independent candidate for mayor of Philadelphia. He took an active part in most of the presidential campaigns and gave a great amount of work to the National Executive Committee, of which he was a member during the Harrison campaign. Upon the election of Harrison, Mr. Wanamaker was invited to enter the cabinet, and although there was much criticism to the effect that a merchant was unfit for a cabinet position, Mr. Wanamaker became Postmaster General and was acknowledged later by his critics to have worked many desirable reforms in the postal system.

From Believer.
The religious side of Mr. Wanamaker's life was one less known to the general public than any other, but one in which he was deeply interested. Very early in life he became a member of the Rev. John Chambers' Presbyterian church in Philadelphia, and it is related that when Dr. Chambers appealed to his congregation for a church suitable to its needs, Mr. Wanamaker, then a boy, shouted enthusiastically: "I'll give a load of bricks from my father's brick yard." Later he gathered together a handful of boys in a shoemaker's shop and formed a Sunday school, which was the nucleus of what is today the Rutgers Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia. The Rutgers Sunday School of which Mr. Wanamaker was superintendent, has 6,000 members, and is said to be the largest Sunday school in the United States. Mr. Wanamaker took particular pride in this school, as well as the Brotherhood of Andrew and Phillip, which he also founded, and it is known that he carried on his work with his constantly an alphabetical index of the members of the school and brotherhood, and that, when time permitted, he studied this list to acquaint himself individually with all the members. His attendance at the Sunday school meetings kept him on his feet almost continuously for eight hours every Sunday, for he often conducted as many as twelve meetings and made short addresses or shortening talks at all of them. Such was his Sunday work the year round for over half a century.

Early in his career Mr. Wanamaker married Mary E. Brown, who co-operated with him in much of his philanthropic work. He founded the Presbyterian Hospital in Philadelphia, the First Point Service Book Store, assisted in erecting many Young Men's Christian Association buildings, and contributed toward college missionary institutions in India, China and Japan. At the outbreak of the European war he was one of the first to assist in the relief of the Belgians, supplying thousands of foodstuffs which were sent to the invaded country.
