LITTLE JACKIE COOGAN GIVES LESSON IN COURAGE

When "Trouble" is shown at the Arcade Theatre starting Thursday, the children hereabouts—boys especially—will receive a lesson in courage and manliness from Jackie Coogan, star of this newest First National attraction.

The little seven year old artist plays the role of an orphan who is adopted by the wife of a brutal plumber. The man not only will not work but he beats his beautiful young wife and the little waif who has come into his home. When Jackie sees his foster mother in tears and realizes there is no food in the house, he undertakes, with disastrous results, to substitute on a plumbing job for the good-for-nothing husband. Though he is a miserable failure as a plumber, the tiny artisan is given five dollars for trying. And when the ruffian tries to take it away from the frail mother Jack starts a battle that winds up with the brute going to jail for a year.

This particular scene in the picture is one that will appeal to children and parents, too; because it is a fine example of child courage and shows more forcibly than any other picture that has been presented here a child's sense of justice and duty.

VIOLA DANA IN NEW PICTURE AT SHERRY'S—LAST DAY

One of the most delightful screen offerings of the year is "The Five Dollar Baby," starring the charming Viola Dana, which was seen for the first time yesterday at the Sherry Theatre. It is a screen version by Metro of Irvin S. Cobb's short story, which appeared in the Saturday Evening Post, and it proved to be a delightfully human play of life in New York's Ghetto. Harry Beaumont directed the film.

Miss Dana was never more mirth-provoking than she is in her newest role. As a rough and ready child of thirteen, brought up by a Jewish pawnbroker, she is highly amusing in the earlier scenes of the play. She is constantly involved in some lively incidents or other with the people of the East Side, all of whom are remarkable fine types.

The story is that of a baby who is abandoned and picked up by a hobo, who pawns her for five dollars. The pawnbroker, who boasts that he "lends money on anything," decides to rear the child himself. When, eighteen years later, he is asked to surrender her to the man who pawned her, he contrives a means of avoiding the performance of his obligation.
