GOVERNMENT OWNS
THREE MILLION BOOKS

Congressional Library Reports Show Rapid Growth.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—Housed in the most beautiful, complete and modern library building in the world, the United States possesses in the Congressional Library the greatest single educational unit extant.

Over 3,000,000 books are now in the collection. To them are to be added manuscripts, maps, and pieces of music to the number of many millions more, with a resultant total implying the existence under a single roof and administration of a mass of collections, literary and artistic, any of which might justly be the entire concern of an independent institution, according to the annual report of the librarian of congress, just submitted to congress.

Since the library was removed from the Capitol to the new building, it has grown at the rate of 1,000,000 a decade. On July 1 last, the books numbered 3,000,048; the maps and charts, 174,093; pieces of music, 954,204, and prints, 428,745. The number of pieces in the map division, with the ordinance and insurance maps itemized, reached 500,000. An itemized count of the manuscripts is impracticable, but if made would show many million folios.

MYSTERY SHIP TO SAIL SOON

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26.—Adventure seekers will soon see a sturdy old whaler, the Narwal, when she sails from the Port of San Francisco about January 1 on a year's cruise in the south Pacific. Captain Charles Arrey, a veteran of many seas will command.

For some time Captain Arrey has been looking for "landlubbers" to sail with him on the Narwal and more than 100 have applied. From this list he recently selected ten. One is a physician, another an attorney, two are Canadian army veterans and another claims he graduated from Annapolis and at one time was picked for the All-American football team. The names will not be announced until the entire crew is selected.

The handpicked crew will act as apprentices and part owners, for each member must subscribe \$500 toward outfitting the boat. They also will man the boat, but to make sure the craft reaches its destination, Captain Arrey also is taking along ten deep-water sailors.

It will be a trading expedition, Captain Arrey said recently, and denied reports that the Narwal was heading south in search of treasure buried by the Germans during the war. The first port of call will be Samoa.
