NERO'S SETS MARK FOR LAVISH PRODUCTION

"Nero," the William Fox super-spectacle, which opened at the Arcade Theatre yesterday, more than lives up to its reputation of being the king-pin among motion pictures. The long line of historic screen stories that preceded it set a high mark for this newest of record-breaking productions.

"Nero" accomplishes with surprising ease the difficult feat of out-distancing the whole list of famous features. Not alone is the production extraordinarily impressive by reason of its magnitude and variety of its marvellously realistic sets, the enormous size and skilled direction of its mobs, and the costliness and magnificence of its thousands of costumes, but also through the strength and deep human appeal of its story.

Written by Charles Sarver and Virginia Tracy, and directed by J. Gordon Edwards, "Nero" discloses a tale of Ancient Rome, set against a background of historic fact that pulsates with the life and color of the time when the greatest tyrant the world has ever known sat upon the throne of the Caesars.

The struggle between Christianity and Paganism is the theme of "Nero" but like all worth-while screen fiction, it is the pure love of a man for a maid that lights up the sombre scenes of crime and evil passion and awakens a responsive glow in the hearts of the spectators.

"Nero" abounds in thrills. Any one of its sensational episodes would be sufficient to make the reputation of an ordinary feature. This Fox production counts them by the dozen, chief of which is the burning of Rome. When the brutal and self-deceived Emperor grasps eagerly the suggestion that he apply the torch to the city and so furnish the inspiration for the composing of a song which shall enable him to exhibit the wonders of his singing voice, the resultant scenes of fright and destruction stand unequalled in motion picture annals as the frenzied populace seeks safety in flight from the mounting flames and crumbling walls.

Beautiful and unusual views of the country around Rome and exquisite reproductions of the interiors of great palaces in the Eternal City are also shown.

The acting is splendidly efficient. As Nero, a French actor named Jacques Grettillat gives a wonderfully life-like characterization of the last of the Caesars. Paulette Goddard, as Poppaea, is revealed as the greatest "vamp" of them all. The beauty and force of her personality and the perfect skill of her acting make her irresistible.

"Nero" will continue as the attraction at the Arcade Theatre today and Wednesday.
