STATE PIONEER DIES IN SALEM

(By Associated Press)
ROSEBURG, Jan. 2.—William Rankin McCord, who crossed the plains in a prairie schooner in 1859, died at the age of 92.
The deceased helped to build the first steamboat launched on the Willamette and invented the small fish wheel. He was for years a fisherman on the Columbia and fought the Indians in the Yakima war.

FARMERS USE DRAIN TILE
HILLSBORO, Ore., Jan. 2.—Washington county lays no claim to being classified among countries depending upon drainage yet the farmers of this county find that the use of drain tile in certain sections improves crop production to the extent that a number of small drainage districts have been formed, the result from which prove the merit of drainage on small tracts.
A drainage district west of Forest Grove and one about midway between Forest Grove and Banks are probably the major projects under way. The main ditches in both districts are partly finished, litigation holding one of them back.

SENATE PASSED BILL
WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—After the calling of the senate's three days' storm through withdrawal by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, of his amendment proposing a world's economic conference, the senate Saturday passed the \$325,000,000 naval appropriation bill and adjourned over New Year's day.
Debate on the Borah amendment was not resumed Saturday, and the bill also was passed without mention of the house provision requesting the president to negotiate with the principal naval powers for further armament limitation. This provision remained in the bill and will go to the president.

60 YEARS IN OFFICE
SALEM, Jan. 2.—George P. Littlefield, for the past 14 years bailiff of the Marion county circuit court, celebrated the anniversary of his first New Year in Oregon 60 years ago tomorrow.
Mr. Littlefield had arrived at Grande Ronde a few days before from Connecticut. He previously had taught school in Massachusetts and New Jersey, but in the fall of 1862, when 22 years of age, decided to cast his lot in Oregon.

EIGHT MILLS TO RUN
ABERDEEN, Wash., Jan. 2.—Eight Grays Harbor mills will resume operations following usual holiday shutdown and several that had not closed will suspend operations for tomorrow. Most of the Aberdeen and Hoquiam plants closed the week preceding Christmas. The Northwestern Lumber company of Hoquiam closed Thursday and will not resume until the last of this month.
