## DAIRYMEN TO STUDY FEEDS

With hay selling at \$15.60 per ton in the stack, the average dairyman must watch feeds closely if he is to make the herd return a profit this year. To assist farmers to plan balanced rations and properly to utilize the feed available, the county agent has arranged for two meetings in the dairy districts in the county at which the feeding of dairy cattle is to be studied. N. C. Jamison, extension dairyman of the Oregon Agricultural college will conduct the meetings. The first of these meetings is to be held at Cove on Wednesday, January 10 at 1:00 P. M. and the second meeting at Union on the following day at the same time.
