It was gold that lured Jack Austin, played by Neal Hart, to go into the burning desert, "the country," some writers say, "God forbid," but Jack favored Jack Austin, and clearing up the matter as to whether he'd been to the desert had denied him. The leader of one of these Jack had struck it rich and was well supplied with gold, and lays his plans to secure it. The concert girl, whom Jack had saved from the wild steer, learns of the plot against Jack Austin and warns him. He thanks her, and as he is not the kind that weakens regardless of odds, his own interests to the sorrow of the bold bad one. They were lured by gold, but as Jack Austin did not figure on allowing them to strike pay dirt that belonged to him, he plays the game of wits and flats with them, in a most thrilling series of incidents. The most thrilling part in the Rodeo contests discover that Jack is an old puncher, and he is invited to take part in their exhibition, which he does, carrying off all the big prizes, for bulldozing, bronco riding and roping. All together, it is one of the most startling pictures Neal Hart ever appeared in.

The cast is a very big one, including all the rodeo celebrities and Spanish dancers brought from Mexico, four of whom introduce fandangos and other native dances. The atmosphere and settings in "Lure of Gold" bring to the screen unusual features and types of character, and in it Neal Hart is at his best.

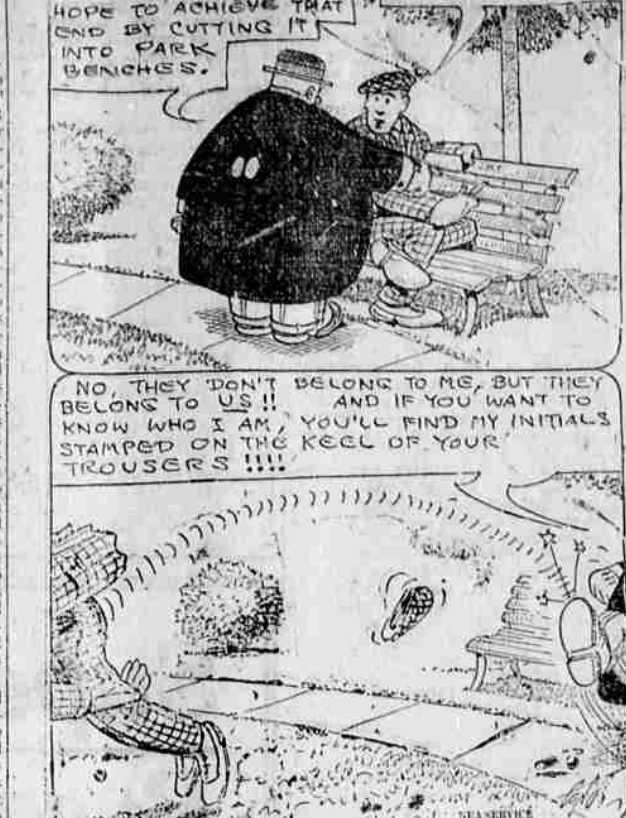

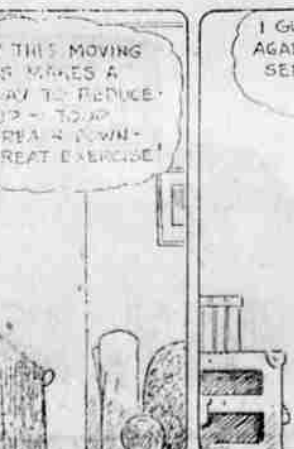
