

BOND DEFAULTS ARE TAKEN UP

Spokane Starts Definite Action Toward Recovering Money for Bondholders On Improvement Bonds.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 9.—Definite action has been started toward recovering money for bondholders on approximately \$1,000,000 worth of city of Spokane local improvement district bonds on which payment is in default.

Word has been received here from a committee composed of representatives of Denver, Colo., bond holders following of plans for foreclosing on property on which improvement district bondholders have not been paid the sale of the property and ultimate recovery, in whole or in part, for the holders of all non-guaranteed bonds issued before 1917 have been obtained, according to the Denver committee. Holders of these bonds have been informed that they will be sent in their improvement district bonds which will be held by the United States National Bank of Denver, legal processes will be started to recover.

If a sufficient number of bondholders send in their bonds by March 1, 1923, action will be commenced on a large scale. The contract between the committee and the bondholders provides that bondholders will bear the expense of legal proceedings and that the protective committee, for the work, will receive not to exceed 3 per cent. Payment is to be made only out of moneys collected on the bonds.

About 300 separate improvement districts are included in the foreclosure plans and nearly 4,000 pieces of city property are involved.

COYOTES IN IDAHO NOW HUNT IN PACKS

(By Associated Press) LEWISTON, Idaho, Jan. 9.—Earlier that coyotes in surrounding mountain districts have developed an instinct for pack hunting is expressed by Harry Walrath, deputy state game warden for Clearwater county. Walrath bases his belief on the discovery of the carcass of a deer in the mountains. Five coyotes were devouring the carcass when it was found.

According to Walrath, coyotes usually hunt singly or in pairs, but rarely in larger groups. He adds that heretofore they have not been considered a menace to game deer, the latter usually being able to protect the fauna from their attacks. He says that the mountain coyotes are larger and more ferocious than the ordinary variety.

FEDERAL SCHOOL FOR HASHERS IS OPENED

SALEM, Jan. 9.—Backed by the United States government, a school for waiters and waitresses has been opened here, and it intends to turn out graduates trained in all the finest points of courteous service, according to Miss Jennie Baker, instructor, and E. E. Elliott, vocational director for Oregon. Expenses of the school are met by funds devoted by the government for vocational training, and fees paid by the students.

The venture, the first of the kind on the Pacific coast, was made to fill a great need, said Mr. Elliott, who pointed out that a good waiter is vastly more than a "slinger of hash or a smasher of crockery. The government, in establishing vocational training courses in various lines has in mind the preparation of workers in callings where there are no apprenticeships and where those engaged in them have no way to learn except "picking them up."

The instruction begins in the kitchen, where the food is assembled and follows each step in the work of serving a patron until the dishes are removed.

"Patrons must not be rushed while they are eating," said Miss Baker. "They must be given ample time between courses and dishes must not be removed prematurely. Neither should the delay between courses be too prolonged. Food must be served promptly, and patrons must not be kept waiting. A smooth operating dining room is as essential to the success of a hotel as treatment accorded at the desk."

According to Mr. Elliott there has been an actual shortage of efficient dining room help, and it is the aim of the movement started here to meet this demand.

ROIRDAN BUYS PAPER

VANCOUVER, Jan. 9.—Jerry Roirdan of La Center today purchased the Clarke County Sun, a weekly paper of this city, from Newell Harlan, who bought it a few months ago from Edward Curran. The paper will be continued as a weekly, according to Mr. Roirdan. The first issue under the new ownership will be January 12.

Mr. Roirdan is a native of Clarke county and was graduated from Vancouver high school and the University of Washington. The Sun was started at Washougal by Mr. Curran, who later moved his plant to Vancouver, changing the name of the paper from the Washougal Sun to its present name. Mr. Curran was compelled to retire because of bad health.

BAKER MEN NOT WORRIED

(By the Associated Press) BAKER, Jan. 9.—With snow piling up in the mountains and at the heads of canyons in semi-glacier formation, Baker county farmers are lessening their worried regarding the source of the water supply for next season's irrigation.

The rains that have followed the snow in this section, have solidified the snow and it is believed there is little danger of its melting rapidly in the spring. In the Greenhorn mountain section, the snow is packed to a depth of nearly 100 feet. The snow is said to be backed to about the same depth in the Granite section, while on Steadman mountains it is about five feet deep. It is expected that these depths will be increased to ten feet or more before the winter is over.

Football Player Sees Twenty-Fifth Season

HONOLULU, T. H., Dec. 15. (By Mail)—Frank Kamae, Hawaiian, has played football 25 years and during the season just closed set such a fast pace that he was regarded as one of the best line men in Hawaii. Kamae, who is 40 years old and the father of 16 children, many years ago earned the title of "cannon-ball," the result of his fierce line charging.

"But the game isn't as of yore," says Kamae. "No fight left in it. It's just a game, the old game with the tackling and the man plays was the snuff," Kamae remarks. "That's when you had to yell 'down' when you had enough. I guess I'll have to retire pretty soon."

Kamae was born on the island of Molokai. He attended St. Louis school and the Kamehameha school, playing football at both. Later he joined with the Honolulu Athletic club, the Cahu team, the Honolulu town team, the First Hawaiian Infantry eleven, and since 1915, with the Palama settlement team. Tackle is his chosen position.

TOKIO BAND TO FINANCE ROADS

(By Associated Press) TOKYO, Jan. 9.—The establishment of a bank with the object of financing private railway enterprises is under contemplation by leading business men here. At present there is no bank for financing railways with

the result that many of the railroads are suffering from lack of funds. The cost of constructing the existing state railways is placed at Yen 1,330,000,000, of which Yen 1,010,000,000 has been defrayed out of loans and the balance by "special funds."

The cost of constructing private railways is placed at Yen 200,000,000, of which Yen 150,000,000 has been paid by the share capital and the balance by means of loans. Street railway construction is placed at Yen 590,000,000, of which 500,000,000 has been met by share capital and the

remaining Yen 90,000,000 by loans. Under these circumstances, a bank designed to finance railways is believed to be necessary. In proposing the establishment of a railway bank at an estimated capital of Yen 30,000,000, the promoters have agreed to apply to the government for assistance such as the right of issuing debenture funds carrying premiums and also for borrowing from the Bank of Japan money at a low rate of interest. The plan probably will be submitted to the next session of the Diet for approval.
