TWO BUCK DEER DO BATTLE TO DEATH

RULING: Manti, Jan. 9.—Mute evidence of a death combat between two whitetail bucks has been discovered in the woods in Lost Prairie by C. E. Hagie.

The deer evidently had locked horns in a fight, which resulted in the death of one of the animals, according to Mr. Hagie. The survivor then had dragged the dead body of his opponent for days, and the coyotes had stripped the flesh to the neck.

With the head and neck of his vanquished opponent clinging to his antlers, the victor apparently had resisted the attacks of the coyotes for a long time, for the hair was worn off the head and neck of the dead buck, where it had rubbed against the survivor's body.

Starvation apparently finished the champion of the woods, whose body was found, still warm, lying on a trail. A pack of half a dozen coyotes had just received their reward for a long vigil.

HONDAGUA TO BE PORT

MANILA, P. I., Dec. 17 (By AP).—The council of state, which includes the governor general, the president of the senate, speaker of the house and department secretaries has decided to make the town of Hondagua on the Pacific coast of the province of Tayabas, a port of entry. This will enable producers to ship their crops direct to the United States and Europe from the Pacific coast, eliminating the need to Manila from that province. Tayabas produces more crops than any other province in the Philippines.
