FARM BUREAU TO MEET SOON

The Union County Farm bureau announces a meeting to be devoted to farm crop production and marketing. The subject of marketing of wheat, wheat production, marketing, soil control, variety tests and tillage methods and county extension work, including the organization of boys and girls clubs and the rodent poisoning project, will be the program of the meeting. At the request of the Oregon Grain Growers' association, the first part of the program has been allotted to this organization. A representative of the association will discuss the marketing of wheat marketing and answer the

questions of local members. B. E. Jackman, extension specialist in farm crops of the Oregon Agricultural college, will discuss wheat production and potato production. General extension work in the county will be discussed by County Agent Avery.

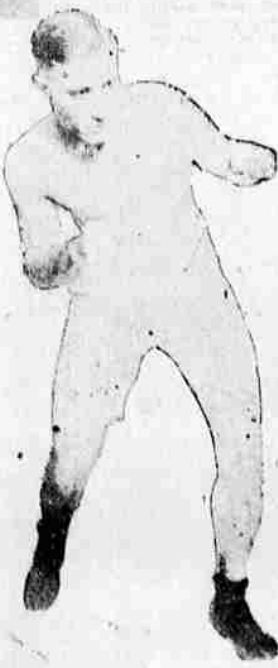
