

GERMANS ARE GOING SOUTH

Immigrants from the Fatherland are flocking to South America.

HAMBURG, Dec. 18. (By Mail).—South American companies gradually are displacing the United States as lands of promise for the European emigrant, German shipping circles declare in the midst of feverish enlargement in their services to the southern half of the Western Hemisphere.

The manner in which the United States has been tightening its immigration restrictions since the war is held to be one of the chief reasons for a shift in the trek westward. At the same time, it is pointed out, new interest is constantly being aroused in the vast opportunities daily opening up in the countries to the south of Panama. Brazil, with her coffee and rubber, Argentina, flourishing in broad ranches and rolling wheat fields, Uruguay, and Paraguay are said to be the principal destinations of those who, bag and baggage, are forsaking war-torn Europe to strike out anew in the southern continent.

Shipping lists from German ports register every month a larger number not only of German emigrants going to South America, but of German salesmen anxious to resume and extend pre-war connections. The companies operating vessels in this service find, further, that there is a growing demand for tourists accommodations.

The Hamburg-America line has been particularly active in making readjustments whereby it can better cater to the new conditions. Already it has the "Baden," "Teutonia," "Baltica" and "Galacia" carrying mails and passengers to and from South America. These are to be supplemented shortly by the "Bayern" and "Wuerttemberg." On all six vessels the greatest attention is given to providing comfortable accommodations for third-class passengers as well as for cabin travellers.

It is stated that the "Bayern" and "Wuerttemberg" will be replaced next month in the North American service by the "Thuringia" and "Westphalia" in a reorganization by which the line plans to extend considerably its traffic between Hamburg and New York. Plying also in this route will be the "Alberic Dullin" and "Deutschland." The enlarged schedule will be inaugurated on January 18 with the sailing of the "Thuringia," which has just reached its final stage of completion. It has accommodations for 120 cabin passengers and 680 third-class.

The last liner of the class which the Hamburg-America line has named after German geographical units left the ways early this month, when the "Hessen" was launched. Her accommodations are the "Hessener," "Wuerttemberg," "Baden," "Preussen," and "Sachsen." Registered at 8,000 gross tonnage and capable of carrying 12,300 tons, she will ply in the freight service with her sister ship, the "Sachsen." The "Hessen" has 42,000 cubic feet of cold-storage space.

In addition to the "Kigoma," one of its pre-war possessions which the Hamburg-America line recently repurchased from the British government, the line has now bought back the "Brasil" from the French. The former, a vessel of 8,000 gross tonnage, will be put into the service to Spain, Cuba and Mexico under the name "Toledo." The "Brasil" registers 6,585 gross tons. Its reassignment has not yet been announced.

RUDYARD KIPLING BIDS FOR HIS OWN FORGOTTEN WORKS

LONDON, Dec. 22. (By Mail).—The earliest unpublished manuscript of Rudyard Kipling, one which he had forgotten existed, has been offered for sale and the highest bidder so far is the author himself. The manuscript contains 12 pages and is entitled "At the Pit's Mouth; Personal recollections of Duncan Paterson—translated from the diary by R. K." and is valued by the owners at 800 pounds sterling. It was written in 1884, while Kipling was a young journalist in India.

The story is a satire on Anglo-Indian society and tells of a man's love for a married woman. One of the "Wee Willie Winkie" stories of the same author has the same title "At the Pit's Mouth" but except of the locality, the resemblance to this early manuscript ends.

Mr. Kipling, when informed that the manuscript had been purchased by the dealers, at first doubted its authenticity but on examination he declared the work genuine, although he only faintly remembered incidents connected with it.

Efforts have been made to publish the manuscript, which is still protected by the original copyright, but Mr. Kipling has refused to give his sanction. This is said to be one of the reasons for his attempt to gain possession of the work.

PAPER EDITED BY MEMORY AND EARS

POPULAR BLAUFUS, Mo., Jan. 10.—Dwight H. Brown, president of the Missouri Press Association, edits a local daily newspaper chiefly with his ears and memory.

At eight years of age, Mr. Brown's eyesight failed, and he received his principal education from his stepmother, who read to him.

His sight never returned sufficiently to permit him to read anything except the larger newspaper headlines, and he cannot distinguish figures more than six feet away. Having an unusual memory and a secretary who reads items from various newspapers to him calling out the page and column of the article, it is not infrequently that Mr. Brown asks for items six months later, specifying the papers, page and column.

Mr. Brown is now 35, and also is president of the Southeast Missouri Press Association, and the Southeast Missouri Democrat Press Association. Brown writes his articles on a typewriter, although he cannot read typewriter type. His printers say he seldom, if ever, strikes a wrong key.

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FRANCE TRIES TO DOWN DRINK

PARIS, Jan. 10.—Dilute trade in absolute users of the habit destroying drink and the caterers to their tastes have evaded the law by a pretended ignorance as to what is an absolute substitute.

Since the law of March 15, 1915, prohibiting absolute, and its substitutes, users of the habit destroying drink and the caterers to their tastes have evaded the law by a pretended ignorance as to what is an absolute substitute.

There was much agitation against absolute, in France previous to the war and during the war it was prohibited. Then there appeared a number of substitutes. The old-fashioned absolute contained 72 per cent alcohol, while the substitutes varied from 25 to 60 per cent. Sometimes the real thing is sold today in old bottles at 50 to 100 francs each, smuggled over from Belgium or Luxembourg, where absolute is still sold over the law.

Exactly what is meant by an absolute substitute. Upon the pure food bureau of the ministry of agriculture through Premier Poincare submitted the matter to President Millerand, and he has issued a decree intended to remove from sale all of these substitute products.

The National Prohibition League has issued a statement, however, declaring that the definition of substitutes does not define, and that in reality the manufacturers of near-absolute have won a victory. The revolution officers engaged in preventing frauds, on the other hand, assert that absolute has become a rarity, with manufacturers afraid to sell it.

"Many a woman, whose family is small and whose husband provides a good living, has become mentally lazy," said Mrs. Walker.

"Instead of having opinion of her own, she has accepted the opinions of her father, husband, brothers and uncles."

Mrs. Walker approves of the principle of the Kansas industrial court, a Kansas issue, but believes the tribunal can be improved. Mrs. Walker has taught school, served as state president, vice-president, district secretary and president of the federation of women's clubs, and in the W. C. T. U., she has been state recording secretary, and is now state vice-president.

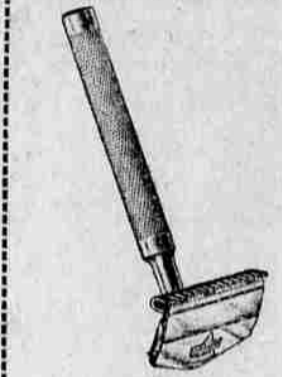
