Starting the season with several veterans the high school basketball team of Union had the nucleus of a strong aggregation to form a fighting five. Coached by R. L. Morgan, noted for his ability to put "pop" into a team, they were going in mid-season form last Saturday night and it took the combined efforts of two La Grande squads to down them. On their home floor, with conditions psychologically in their favor by a large margin, no one would be surprised if they handed the local bunch a defeat. When they are called the big "red" team the statement doesn't wave from the truth a bit. They are big and the red uniforms they wear are part of a color scheme that means "fight."

Elgin Strength Unknown.

The strength of the Elgin team, who will be met Saturday night, is a matter of conjecture. Last year they had a strong aggregation and were capable of giving any team in Eastern Oregon a hard fight. With several of last year's team back, it is a cinch that they will be far from a set-up and from rumors, it appears that they are going to be hard to down.

The La Grande squad, which includes ten men, is spending a week of intensive practice and they are rapidly rounding up into the best of form. Cecil Snow, temporary coach, is carrying the work started by "Sheet" Reynolds, along at a fine rate and the team is improving with each workout.

### TRIP TO THE CAPITOL CITY WAS WET ONE

high water mark and seemingly trying to break all previous records for wetness. Sunday morning a dismal air spread over the city of Portland, due to a number of legislators who had congregated there having been bluntly informed that the highways between Portland and Salem were under water and that railroads and electric lines were not safe as a means of travel. After many conferences our old friend, John M. Scott, General Passenger Agent of the Southern Pacific was appealed to and true to his early training, he said there was no such word as "caut" when it became necessary to transport legislators of Oregon from the metropolis to the state capital. He therefore ordered out a steam train Sunday afternoon which took the remaining members on their journey through the flooded districts. It was not uncommon to travel with water running over the fiftieth steps of the coaches and between Portland and Oregon City the rather amusing situation occurred when the engineer demanded that a pilot be placed on the cow-catcher, armed with a pike pole to steer the drift wood past the locomotive. Thus we traveled inch at a time until the state capital was reached and we entered the hostelry known as the Marion Hotel, run along strictly modern lines, by Al Pierce and Jim Lynne.

Old Acquaintance Renewed.

Old familiar faces of legislative days appeared in the Marion Hotel lobby and the greeting between Oregonian and Oregonian was very cordial. That there was strife in the Senate for the presidency, in a measure was overlooked in the three hours of visiting and by the time midnight arrived, courtesies had been extended in a personal way between many of the members of both houses. The wetness of the valley was offset by the dryness of the members, indicating that prohibition is having quite a telling effect upon the people of Oregon after all. Pierce, the new governor of Oregon, was as busy and thoroughly occupied as August Stange the first night he put in his new radio. Fred B. Curry, former City Manager of La Grande and now State Organizer for the Modern Woodman Lodge, took sufficient time from his pressing duties to journey to Salem and visit with his former chief a few hours prior to the inauguration. J. E. Reynolds and other members of the State Fair Board, naturally found it convenient to hold a meeting in Salem on the day of the inauguration.
