## Helix Marshall Indicted Charged With Murder

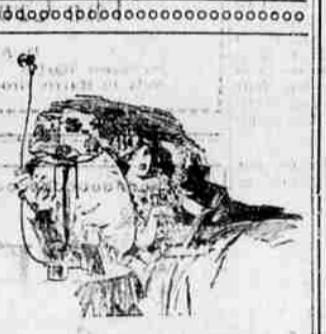

# ALASKA UNHIT BY TWO TRIALS

JUNEAU, Alaska, Jan. 11.—Despite the recent decision of the United States supreme court that persons convicted in state courts of violation of state liquor statutes could be tried in federal courts for the same offense under the Volstead act, the ruling will not be applied to Alaska, according to advices from the department of justice to United States District Attorney A. G. Shoup.

Recently federal prohibition enforcement officers raised the question whether persons convicted under the territorial "bone dry" act could be prosecuted for Volstead law violation.

Mary Walker Willbrandt, assistant to Attorney General Daugherty, in an opinion written for Mr. Shoup, said: "This department is inclined to think that a plea of former jeopardy to a second indictment would be sustained as a matter of law, since both laws which were violated emanate from the same sovereignty."

## SALMON SIGHT SEEN

SEASIDE, Jan. 11.—A half dozen salmon weighing from 10 to 15 pounds each impaled by their gills on a barbed wire fence was the unusual spectacle witnessed yesterday morning by Benjamin Rogers, who operates a box ranch two miles south of this city on the upper Necanicum river.

Mr. Rogers states he went out to feed his prize porkers and found the fish dangling from the fence wire. "The Necanicum," he explained, had been on a rampage for several days, overflowing its banks and entirely covered the fence which surrounds a portion of his ranch. The water subsided and left the salmon which have been upstream during the spawning season.

BAKER, Jan. 11.—Trainmen and passengers on the "Baker-bound" Sumpter valley train foiled efforts at self-injury by Charles Linnbaug, 25 years old, construction worker in Grant county. # INAUGURATION BARBEQUE BIG

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 11.—A milling, joyous, carefree crowd of more than 100,000 persons saw Governor L. C. Walton inducted into office Tuesday, at a public ceremony at the state fair grounds.

Following the governor's speech the cry went up that the barbecue was ready, and at 1 o'clock serving of the feast commenced.

It was a scene such as Oklahomans never had witnessed before. The throng formed in rough lines before the serving stands as barbecue assistants began handing out great chunks of beef, buffalo, bear and reindeer meat. Bread sliced and piled high began to shrink under the onslaught.

Two giant coffee urns, each holding 10,000 gallons and heated by a steam engine, likewise became the mecca of the thousands.
